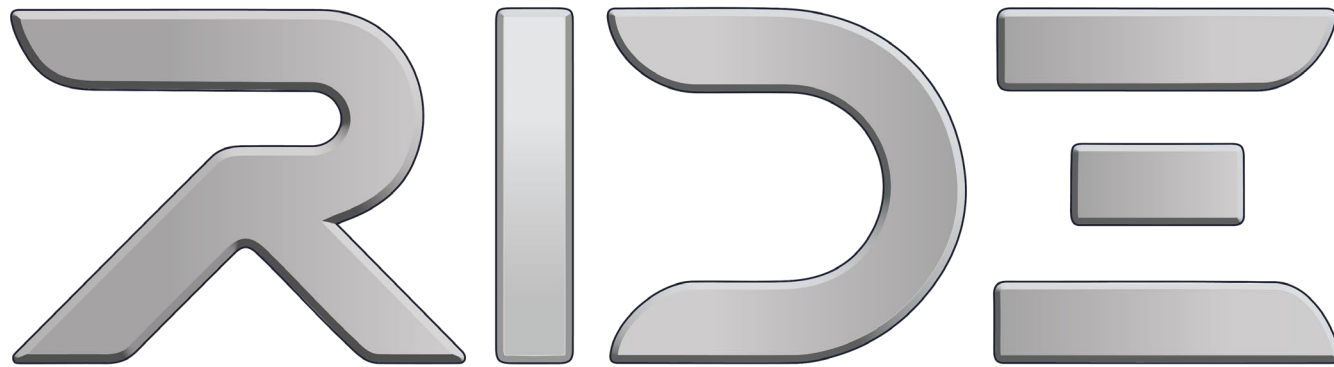

a. North Texas Zero Emission Vehicle Project

Alyssa Cunningham

Summary: The North Texas Zero Emission Vehicle (NTxZEV) Project, funded by a \$60 million EPA Clean Heavy-Duty Vehicles grant, aims to replace emitting (i.e. diesel, gasoline, propane, and natural gas) Class 6 and 7 heavy-duty vocational vehicles with battery-electric or hydrogen fuel cell vehicles and install supporting infrastructure within the 16-county NCTCOG region. Staff provided an overview of a Call for Projects to select/award vehicle replacements. Applications must be received "in-hand" by 5PM Friday, February 13, 2026.

Summary: Draft elements of the Dallas-Fort Worth Air Quality Improvement Plan (DFW AQIP) related to transportation were presented. Elements presented included: Background on the DFW AQIP; Draft carbon dioxide equivalent (CO₂e) emissions inventory for 2022 and projections for CO₂e emissions through the year 2050; and the Transportation Measures and Targets. 12 Transportation Measures were shown, with the measures split into one of the following categories: vehicle/equipment technology upgrades, systems operations, and mode shifts.

a. National Drive Electric Month Results

Summary: Staff recapped this year's Dallas-Fort Worth National Drive Electric Month (DFW NDEM). The annual NDEM Event was a success in Downtown Denton Square at the Arts & Autos – Electric Avenue event. Over 300 attendees checked in at the event, and more than 100 electric vehicle (EV) test drives were completed — with 38% of drivers experiencing an EV for the very first time!

b. Multimodal Delivery Project Results

Summary: Staff presented the results of the Multimodal Delivery Project, which NCTCOG supported and was led by the City of Arlington. Funded by the DOE, this project aims to promote autonomous zero emission delivery to transportation challenged populations. NCTCOG shared key findings from the energy and emissions analysis as well as the replication guide developed for the project.

c. Charging Smart Designations

Carolyn Burns

Summary: Charging Smart is a national designation and technical assistance program that recognizes cities based on the EV-ready actions they take. With technical assistance provided by NCTCOG/DFWCC, municipalities can complete a variety of actions such as streamlining cities' EVSE permitting process and creating an educational EV webpage to receive a designation. The Cities of Arlington, Mesquite, and Lewisville have recently been awarded the Charging Smart Bronze Designation and are the first cities in Texas to do so.

d. B99 Ribbon Cutting

Summary: Staff shared information from the ribbon cutting of a B99 biodiesel station at a Pilot Travel Center in South Dallas. The station is the result of a collaboration between multiple companies to offer B99 and the facility is the first of its kind in Texas.

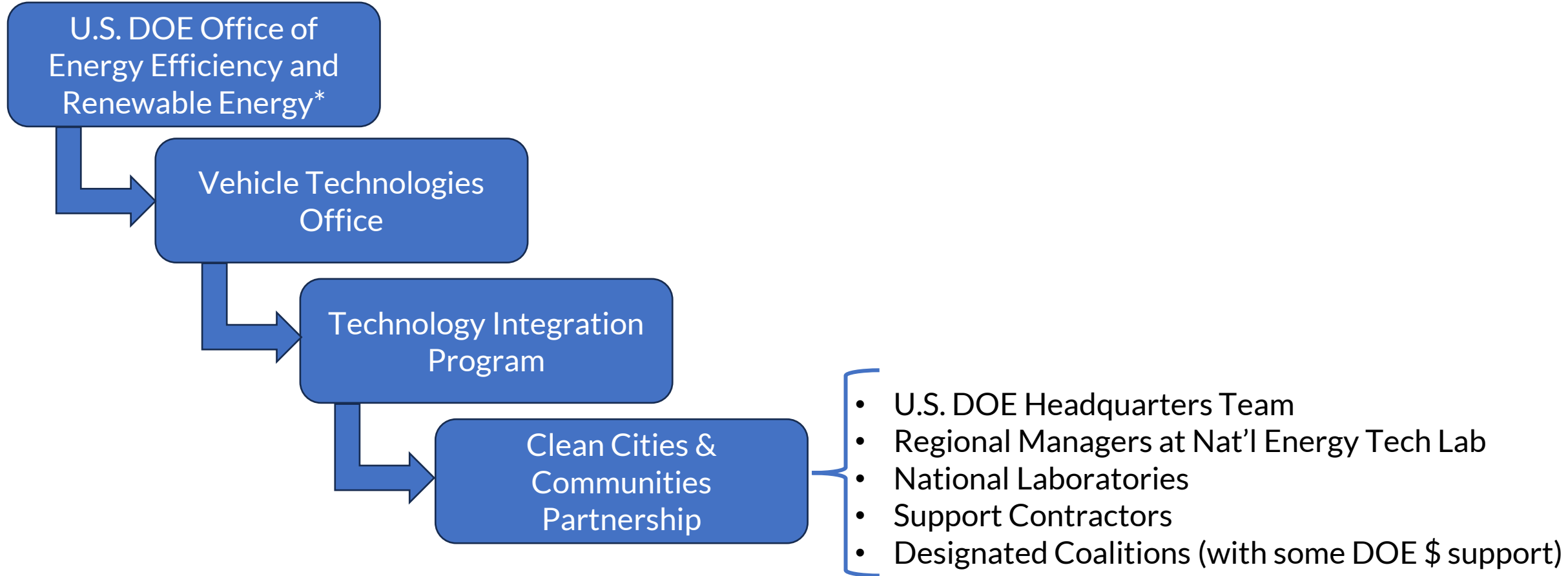

3. Featured Item – Federal Update

\$110,000 Funding Contract for April 2025-March 2026 still outstanding

- Previously appropriated but contracts never distributed

Funding for Fiscal Year 2026

- Encompassed within Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations
 - H.R. 6938 passed House on 1/9/26 by a vote of 397-28; passed Senate on 1-16-26 by a vote of 82-15
 - “The Department is directed to continue to support the Clean Cities alternative fuels deployment program...”
 - \$20M for direct cooperative agreements with Coalitions
 - \$40M for competitive grants to support alternative fuel, infrastructure, new mobility, and vehicle deployment activities

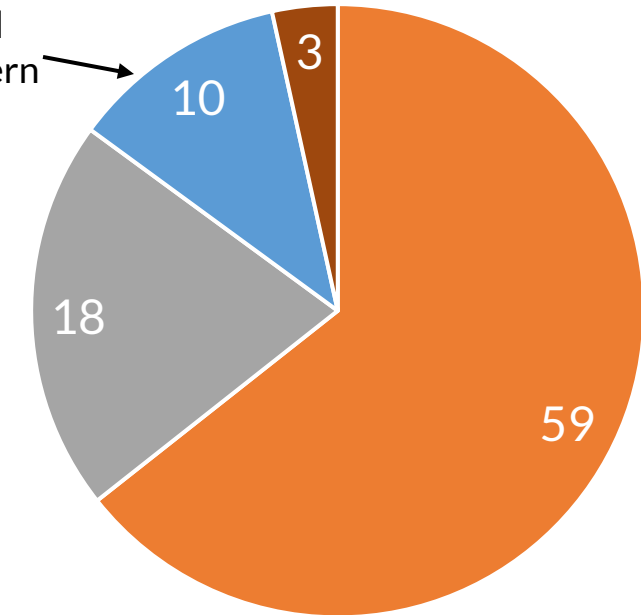
