Item 1 Approval of Minutes - September 25, 2025

Item 2 Resolution to Review and Approve NCTCOG's Investment Policy

Board approval was requested to approve NCTCOG's Investment Policy which includes a listing of authorized brokers that is updated annually. No changes were recommended.

Item 3 Resolution Authorizing Purchase of Enterprise Resource Planning Consultancy Services from Premier Consulting & Integration, LLC

Board authorization was requested to enter a five-year contract with Premier Consulting & Integration, LLC, for the provision of Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) Consultancy Services to support NCTCOG's accounting, procurement, Human Resources, time and expense and payroll platforms. The contract, not to exceed \$360,000, will be available through the TXShare Cooperative Purchasing Program.

Item 4 <u>Resolution Authorizing Contracts for Fire Truck Inspection Services for Hoses, Pumps,</u> Nozzles, Aerial & Ground Ladders

Board authorization was requested authorizing contracts for Fire Truck Inspection Services for hoses, pumps, nozzles, aerial and ground ladders through the North Central Texas Council of Governments TXShare cooperative purchasing program. NCTCOG issued RFP 2025-078 and received two responsive proposals, which were evaluated by representatives from the Cities of Mesquite, McKinney, and Stephenville. Based on the committee's recommendation, contracts are proposed to be awarded to Axcess Hose & Ladder Co. Inc. for Service Categories 1 (Testing & Inspection), 2 (Repair Services), and 3 (Other Ancillary Goods or Services), and to Waterway North Texas, Inc. for Service Category 1. The contracts will be available for up to five years and accessible to agencies nationwide in the vendors' service regions.

Item 5 Resolution Authorizing Contracts for Bicycle Safety Infrastructure

Board authorization was requested authorizing contracts for Bicycle Safety Infrastructure through the North Central Texas Council of Governments' TXShare cooperative purchasing program. In response to RFP 2025-091, two responsive proposals were received and evaluated by a committee consisting of representatives from the Cities of Dallas and Fort Worth, along with NCTCOG staff. Based on the committee's recommendation, contracts are proposed to be awarded to ITS Plus, Inc. for Service Category 4, and Team Better Block LLC for Service Categories 1, 2, 3, 6, and 8. The contracts will be valid for up to five years and made available to agencies nationwide within the vendors' respective service regions.

Item Resolution Endorsing Submittal of Alzheimer's Disease Programs Initiative Grant Application and Acceptance of Funding

Board authorization was requested endorsing the submittal and acceptance of a \$750,000 grant awarded to the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) by the Administration for Community Living under the Alzheimer's Disease Programs Initiative. The three-year cooperative agreement, effective October 1, 2025, through September 30, 2028, will support the integration of community health workers in the Aging program to conduct dementia screenings, facilitate diagnostic referrals, and provide counseling services. NCTCOG will fulfill the required 25% match through a combination of state funds and in-kind contributions.

Resolution Authorizing a Contract with Acumen Fiscal Agent for Fiscal Management ltem 7 Services

Board authorization was requested to enter a contract with Acumen Fiscal Agent, LLC, to provide Fiscal Management Services (FMS) for the Veterans Directed Care (VDC) program. The current FMS provider, Allied Community Resources (ACR), will terminate its contract effective December 31, 2025. Following a competitive procurement process initiated in July 2025, Acumen was selected to assume FMS responsibilities, including payroll processing and claim submissions to the Veterans Administration. The approved contract will have a maximum term through October 31, 2030.

Resolution Authorizing Budget Application to the Texas Commission of Environmental Item 8 Quality Regional Solid Waste Program and Subsequent Program Implementation

This item was pulled from the Consent Agenda for Individual Review from Judge Boedeker.

9 Resolution Authorizing Agreements for the Receipt of Funds for Planning and Item Implementation Programs from the Texas Department of Transportation

Board authorization was requested to receive funding and execute necessary agreements with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to support the continuation and enhancement of transportation and air quality initiatives, as approved by the Regional Transportation Council (RTC). These initiatives focus on congestion reduction, multi-modal transportation, and air quality improvements. In preparation for Fiscal Year 2026 agreements, staff presented two additional projects totaling approximately \$2,275,000 in Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program funds, along with \$455,000 in RTC Transportation Development Credits to serve as the local match. NCTCOG will coordinate with TxDOT to enter into agreements to receive these funds. Funding details of each project are identified below.

Resolution Approving Additional Local Match for the Federal Transit Administration Item 10 Grant for the Trinity Railway Express Transit-Oriented Development Plan

Board approval was requested to increase the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) Local match by \$50,000 for the Trinity Railway Express Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) Planning project. The project was awarded a \$1 million Federal Transit Administration (FTA) FY2024 TOD Planning Pilot Program grant, exceeding the original request of \$800,000. To meet the required match for the increased federal award, the total RTC Local contribution was increased from \$200,000 to \$250,000, resulting in a total project budget of \$1.25 million. To expedite execution of the grant prior to the end of FY2025, NCTCOG utilized the Transportation Director's authority under RTC Policy P20-02 to commit the additional funds, which were subsequently ratified by RTC in October 2025. The Executive Board approved the increased project budget and authorized staff to proceed with implementation of the grant.

Item 11 Resolution Authorizing Contract with HEM Data Corporation for the Purchase of the DAWN OBD Inspector with Tamper Detect and Software Services

Board authorization was requested to enter a contract with HEM Data Corporation for the purchase of two DAWN OBD Inspector with Tamper Detect devices and associated software services, in an amount not to exceed \$96,125 for a two-year period. This procurement supports implementation of the Regional Transportation Council's (RTC) Truck Assessment and Goods Movement Program, which evaluates the prevalence and impact of tampered heavy-duty diesel engines in the region. HEM Data Corporation was the sole respondent to NCTCOG's request for quotes. The equipment will be used at Commercial Vehicle Events to collect engine data and assess emissions control system integrity. Funding will be provided through previously allocated Regional Toll Revenue (RTR) funds.

Item 12 Resolution Authorizing Receipt of Federal Transit Administration Formula Funding and Agreements to Implement Transit Projects

Board approval was requested authorizing receipt of Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funding and subrecipient agreements as follows:

- Approximately \$10.4 million in FY 2025 Urbanized Area Formula Program funds
- Approximately \$3.5 million in FY2024 funds and \$1.2 million in FY2025 Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Program funds
- Approximately \$800,000 in FY 2025 Bus and Bus Facilities Program funds

Item 13 Resolution Authorizing Agreements Supporting Mobility for Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities

Board authorization was requested to execute or amend agreements with transit providers to implement enhanced mobility projects funded through the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 Program. This administrative item includes programming of \$890,000 in older, previously nonprogrammed federal funds, revisions to prior Executive Board approvals, and allocation of unexpended balances. As the designated recipient for FTA funds in the region, NCTCOG will administer these funds in accordance with Regional Transportation Council (RTC) directives and the 2025–2028 Transportation Improvement Program. Local match requirements will be met through a combination of local funds and Transportation Development Credits (TDCs), consistent with RTC actions.

The table below details new and continuing enhanced mobility projects that require agreements and agreement changes to implement initiatives as approved by the RTC.

Item 14 Resolution Authorizing Agreements with Subrecipients for the Community Noise Mitigation Program

Board authorization was requested to enter into subrecipient agreements with Lake Worth Independent School District and White Settlement Independent School District to administer \$3.4 million in federal funding awarded through the U.S. Department of Defense's Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC) Community Noise Mitigation Program. The funding will support noise insulation improvements at six school facilities impacted by military aviation operations near Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base Fort Worth. An additional \$200,000 will support NCTCOG's post-construction acoustical testing. The total \$3.6 million grant includes non-federal match contributions from the participating ISDs and Regional Transportation Council (RTC) Local funds.

Item 15 Resolution Authorizing a Contract with HNTB Corporation to Complete Step 1 of the Federal Railroad Administration's Corridor Identification and Development Program for the Fort Worth to Houston High-Speed Rail Corridor

This item was pulled from the Consent Agenda for Individual Consideration by Councilmember Mendelsohn.

Upon a Motion by Councilmember Horne (seconded by Mayor Bristol), to approve Consent Agenda Items 1 - 15, and unanimous vote of all members present, the Board approved the Consent Agenda Items as posted with the exception of Items 8 and 15 which were requested to be considered individually.

²Transportation Development Credits (TDCs) for "Strategic Award to Small Transit Providers" are credits (not dollars) used to leverage federal funds in lieu of local cash match. The result is the capital portion of the project will be 100% federally funded.

ITEMS FOR INDIVIDUAL CONSIDERATION:

Item 8 Resolution Authorizing Budget Application to the Texas Commission of Environmental Quality Regional Solid Waste Program and Subsequent Program Implementation

This item was pulled from the Consent Agenda for Individual Review from Judge Boedeker.

Board authorization was requested to submit the Fiscal Year 2026 and 2027 Regional Solid Waste Program Budget Application to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and to implement subrecipient agreements subject to final TCEQ approval. NCTCOG, as the designated regional solid waste management planning agency, has been allocated approximately \$2.2 million in state funds for the biennium. The Resource Conservation Council (RCC) recommended funding allocations of 68% (\$768,476.57) for local government projects and 32% (\$362,250.95) for regional initiatives. On August 19, 2025, the RCC approved eight local and three regional projects totaling \$1,130,727.52. Additionally, staff requested authorization to reallocate any unexpended funds at the direction of the RCC, with the approval of TCEQ. The Regional Solid Waste Program Budget Application can be viewed at https://www.nctcog.org/envir/materials-management/grants.

Judge Boedeker asked whether the Regional Solid Waste Program was available on the website, and Ms. Alvarez confirmed it was and that she could also send him the link. He also expressed concern about landfill capacity in his region and asked Ms. Alvarez to speak on planning efforts. She shared that a study had been conducted indicating the western region is particularly capacity-limited, with less than ten years of availability remaining. Ms. Alvarez noted that the City of Fort Worth had recently reached out and plans to present ideas at the next regular meeting. She also mentioned a \$70 million EPA grant application aimed at enhancing waste disposal infrastructure in the western region, emphasizing that as the region grows, waste generation will increase. Judge Boedeker appreciated the team's proactive approach. Councilmember Mendelsohn asked whether all applicants received funding or if some did not meet the criteria. Ms. Alvarez responded that she believed most applicants were funded and was not aware of any that were declined. Councilmember Hogg suggested this would be useful follow-up information, and several Board members requested a copy of the presentation.

Mayor Pro Tem Flores entered the meeting.

Upon a Motion by Commissioner Mitchell (seconded by Councilmember Mendelsohn), and unanimous vote of all members present, the Board approved the resolution as presented.

Item 15 Resolution Authorizing a Contract with HNTB Corporation to Complete Step 1 of the Federal Railroad Administration's Corridor Identification and Development Program for the Fort Worth to Houston High-Speed Rail Corridor

This item was pulled from the Consent Agenda for Individual Consideration by Councilmember Mendelsohn.

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board authorization to enter into a contract with HNTB Corporation to complete Step 1 of the Federal Railroad Administration's (FRA) Corridor Identification and Development Program for the Fort Worth to Houston High-Speed Rail Corridor. He explained that this item was brought before the Board at its September 25, 2025, meeting as a status item. He further explained that NCTCOG was awarded a \$500,000 FRA discretionary grant to support this effort, with a grant amendment issued on October 14, 2025, extending the award period through April 30, 2026. Following a competitive procurement process initiated on October 25, 2024, and subsequent interviews with qualified firms, the Selection Committee recommended HNTB Corporation for contract award. Step 1 activities will include the development of a scope, schedule, and budget for Step 2, which will culminate in a Service Development Plan. The Corridor ID program's Step 1 is funded entirely with FRA grant funding and requires no local match. Staff proposed that the contract be co-terminus with the FRA grant agreement and requested Executive Board authorization, in its capacity as fiscal agent for the Regional Transportation Council, to execute a contract with HNTB Corporation in an amount not to exceed \$400,000.

Councilmember Mendelsohn raised concerns regarding the pursuit of environmental clearance for the high-speed rail corridor in the absence of route concurrence from the City of Dallas. Mr. Morris noted that while economicc development studies have been initiated by the Hunts and Dallas, studies from Arlington and Fort Worth are still pending. Ms. Mendelsohn emphasized that of the two alignment options, one has been explicitly rejected by the City Council. The remaining option—the western alignment—was recently impacted by the convention center redevelopment, which placed a vertiport in a location potentially incompatible with the proposed high-speed rail alignment. Councilmember Mendelsohn noted that the project will likely require a full Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS), and recommended deferring action until Dallas formally approves an alignment.

Judge Hill inquired whether this constituted a motion to table, which Councilmember Mendelsohn confirmed, requesting staff to return with the item once Dallas has completed its review. Judge Hill seconded the motion to table. Following extensive discussion among Board members regarding the urgency of advancing the item, Mayor Hulsey called the question. The motion to Call the Question was seconded by Councilmember Hogg. Upon vote, the motion to Call the Question passed. The Board then took up the Motion to Table by Councilmember Mendelsohn and seconded by Judge Hill, which passed. Councilmember Justice, Councilmember Hogg, and Councilmember Horne voted no. Judge Boedeker raised a point of clarification on the motion to table to confirm it did not have a definite time.

Item 17 Resolution Authorizing Contract with HNTB Corporation to Design a Retrofit of Las Colinas Automated Transportation System

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board authorization to enter into a contract with HNTB Corporation for the Las Colinas Automated Transportation System (ATS) infrastructure retrofit project. The contract, not to exceed \$490,000, will be funded with Surface Transportation Block Grant Program funds and Transportation Development Credits in lieu of local match. The project will advance the design and engineering of approximately one mile of existing ATS infrastructure in the Las Colinas District of Irving, Texas, to prepare for next-generation automated transit technology. The scope includes project management, infrastructure evaluation, retrofit assessment, environmental documentation, and development of an implementation plan. HNTB was the

sole respondent to the Request for Proposals issued on June 6, 2025, and was recommended by the Selection Committee following evaluation.

Item 18 Status Report on Air Quality and Resolution Approving Scoring Criteria for the North Texas Zero Emission Vehicle Call for Projects

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, and Susan Alvarez, Director of Environment and Development, provided a status report on regional air quality, highlighting challenges in meeting the National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) for ozone, the region's current "severe" nonattainment classification, and the potential consequences of failing to attain compliance by the July 20, 2027, deadline. The report emphasized the need for enhanced air quality initiatives, including efforts to reduce emissions from heavy-duty diesel vehicles. Following the briefing, Executive Board approval was requested of the proposed scoring criteria for the North Texas Zero Emission Vehicle (NTxZEV) Call for Projects. This initiative, funded by a \$60 million grant from the Environmental Protection Agency's Clean Heavy-Duty Vehicles Program, will provide approximately \$58.6 million in rebates for the replacement of Class 6 and 7 vocational vehicles with zero-emission alternatives. The remaining funds will support training and workforce development. The Regional Transportation Council approved the opening of this Call for Projects, including eligibility, screening, scoring criteria, and the schedule at its October 9, 2025, meeting.

Item Title: Resolution Amending the Utility Rate for the Workforce Centers as Procured by the

Texas CUC Aggregation Project

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG), in its capacity as the Administrative Entity and designated Grant Recipient/Fiscal Agent of the North Central Texas Workforce Development Board, operates eleven (11) Workforce center facilities throughout the region.

In October 2017, the Executive Board authorized membership into the Texas CUC Aggregation Project (dba Public Power Pool). The Public Power Pool organization is a political subdivision corporation pursuant to Chapter 304 of the Texas Local Government Code which was formed to aggregate the purchasing of electricity for all member political subdivisions with the goal of obtaining electricity rates that are lower than any individual political subdivision could obtain by itself. At that time, Public Power Pool was authorized to solicit utility rates for seven (7) of the NCTCOG's Workforce Centers with a rate not to exceed \$.039 per Kilowatt hour.

In December 2022, the Executive Board authorized an amended three (3) year rate not to exceed \$.059 per kilowatt hour for eight (8) of the Workforce Centers.

Public Power Pool has recently completed its latest procurement for electricity services for six (6) of the Workforce Centers. The new three (3) year rate is proposed to not exceed \$.0622 per kilowatt hour. This amended rate was recommended for approval by the North Central Texas Workforce Development Board on November 4, 2025. A draft resolution authorizing the purchase of electricity utilizing Public Power Pool, at an amended rate not to exceed \$.0622 per Kilowatt hour effective January 2026, is attached for Executive Board consideration.

Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Terrell Workforce Center Lease Extension

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG), in its capacity as the Administrative Entity and designated Grant Recipient/Fiscal Agent of the North Central Texas Workforce Development Board, currently operates a workforce center located at 109 Tejas Drive, Suites 300, 500, and 700 in Terrell, Texas. The center encompasses 7,012 square feet of office space at a price of \$14.08 per square foot (excluding insurance, taxes, utilities, janitorial, and common area maintenance), and its five (5) year lease term is scheduled to end on January 31, 2026. The building is owned by CS & RF Investments, LLC. The 7,012 square feet includes a suite dedicated for TWC Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) staff who are co-located in the Terrell Workforce Center.

Staff have been analyzing regional data including population growth, job growth, unemployment rates, poverty rates, and child care access to better understand how, where, and when customers are choosing to engage with and access Workforce Solutions programs and services from a short, mid, and long-term perspective. This analysis will include collaboration with the North Central Texas Workforce Development Board's new subrecipient, Career Team, beginning in FY 2026.

NCTCOG staff recommends extending the current Terrell Center lease for two (2) years to allow for staff to develop a strategic and comprehensive approach to where and how many stand-alone Centers are located throughout the 14-County region. A more moderate lease extension term will provide optimal flexibility for staff to introduce a new service delivery model should the current Terrell Center model not meet the needs of evolving Workforce Solutions customer engagement behaviors.

The landlord, CS & RF Investments, LLC, has agreed to a two (2) year lease extension agreement for the current Terrell Workforce Center at an average price per square foot not to exceed \$16.00. The base rental rate excludes insurance, taxes, utilities, janitorial, and common area maintenance. NCTCOG's real estate broker, Avison Young, conducted a current market survey of other comparable properties (see Exhibit A) and confirmed the proposed rate for this Center is within the market price for the surrounding area. As of September 2025, there is no alternative retail or office space available.

Until the strategic and comprehensive service and program delivery plan for the region is finalized, NCTCOG staff is recommending the lease extension due to the following considerations:

- Pricing: Within market range of the Terrell area.
- Location: Favorable proximity to major roads and thoroughfares in Terrell.
- Square Footage: 7,012 square feet of useable office space.

the Project Design by Railroad Partners for the Bonds Ranch Road Grade

Separation

Tarrant County, the Texas Department of Transportation, the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) and the City of Fort Worth have been working to eliminate the two atgrade rail crossings at Bonds Ranch Road near Business 287. Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) and Union Pacific (UP) are the railroads at the crossings. As part of this effort, Tarrant County has led the design efforts of the grade separations. A critical element of the design process is the engineering review by the railroads. As with all rail projects, the agency overseeing design is required to enter into an agreement with the railroad and pay for the railroad's cost of its review. The County has requested funding to fund the railroad review. The RTC approved funding in March 2021 for railroad review. The cost is estimated to be \$500,000 for each railroad for a total of \$1,000,000.

In its role as the RTC's fiscal agent, Executive Board approval will be requested to enter into an agreement with Tarrant County for an amount not to exceed \$1,000,000 to facilitate design review with BNSF and UP. This project will utilize up to \$1,000,000 of Surface Transportation Block Grant Program funds matched with 200,000 Transportation Development Credits in lieu of cash match. This grade separation is being submitted this month as part of the new \$250,000,000 Texas Department of Transportation off-system grade separation program.

A draft resolution authorizing an agreement with Tarrant County to facilitate review of the project design by railroad partners for the Bonds Ranch Road Grade Separation is attached for Executive Board consideration. I will be available to answer any questions the Board may have on this item.

High Occupancy Vehicle Discount on TEXpress Lanes

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) on August 15, 2025, for auto occupancy detection and verification integration and support services for High Occupancy Vehicle (HOV) discount on TEXpress lanes. This scope of work will include the procurement of support services to update the existing Interface Control Document for data exchange with the GoCarma System and monthly reconciliation reports to ensure the HOV discount program operates with transparency and stakeholder confidence. Three proposals were received as part of the RFP. The Selection Committee met on September 26, 2025, to discuss and evaluate the submitted proposals. The Selection Committee recommended Milligan Partners for this project. Pursuant to the recently published Interim Final Rule for the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program from the U.S. Department of Transportation, there is no DBE goal for this contract.

This project is funded with Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) program funds with Transportation Development Credits in lieu of cash match. In its role as RTC's fiscal agent, Executive Board approval will be requested to enter into a consultant contract with Milligan Partners, LLC to carry out this RTC initiative. The request will include approval of a contract for an initial one-year term of up to \$227,000, with four one-year optional renewals totaling approximately \$293,000 (for four years), for a total five-year contract not to exceed \$520,000 in STBG program funds and TDCs in lieu of cash match. NCTCOG has current funding authorization of approximately \$227,000 for this contract, which is sufficient for the initial one-year term. Additional funding authorization to cover the second one-year optional renewal is forthcoming from the Texas Department of Transportation. Funding for third, fourth and fifth one-year optional renewal is subject to the RTC allocating additional funding.

Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Agreement with Waste Management of Texas, Inc., for

the North Texas Diesel Emissions Reduction Project

The Regional Transportation Council (RTC) opened the North Texas Diesel Emissions Reduction Project (NTDER) Call for Projects (CFP) on December 16, 2024. This initiative is funded from approximately \$1.6 million previously awarded from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) National Clean Diesel Funding Assistance Program to reduce emissions of ozone-forming nitrogen oxides from diesel-powered heavy-duty vehicles or equipment in the Dallas-Fort Worth 10-county ozone nonattainment area by replacing older, high-emitting vehicles, engines, or equipment with new, low-emitting vehicles, engines, or equipment, as well as installing locomotive idle-reduction technology and related infrastructure.

Eligible applicants of NTDER include private companies and public entities such as local governments who own heavy-duty diesel vehicles or equipment operating in the nonattainment area and who have adopted the RTC Clean Fleet Policy. Based on applications and available NTDER funding, one eligible project was received from Waste Management of Texas, Inc. (Waste Management). Staff recommends a rebate award to Waste Management of Texas, Inc., not to exceed a total of \$461,184 in EPA funds to replace four diesel vehicles with newer, alternative fuel vehicles. As required by the EPA for replacement projects, Waste Management of Texas will provide a local contribution of at least 65 percent of the project cost. The proposed project will benefit residents because it reduces diesel engine emissions that create ground-level ozone and reduces noise. The RTC approved funding for this CFP recommendation at its November 13, 2025, meeting.

After funding the recommendation, a balance of approximately \$100,000 remains for the NTCDP and will be made available through continuing funding opportunities. In its role as RTC's fiscal agent, Executive Board approval will be requested to enter into an agreement with Waste Management of Texas, Inc., to carry out this RTC initiative.

The US 75 corridor is currently under construction to implement a technology lane along the corridor with an anticipated completion in the Summer of 2026. While the corridor is under construction, there is reduced capacity which requires quick incident response and clearance. The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) has been working with emergency response agencies within the corridor to provide access to technology to monitor crashes and help with debris removal, as well as implement quick incident response and clearance. A key component to quick incident response and clearance is ensuring that tow trucks are located within proximity to the corridor. Hours of service will be adjusted based on usage. The Regional Transportation Council approved funding for this purpose in December 2024. Pursuant to the recently published Interim Final Rule for the Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program from the U.S. Department of Transportation, there is no DBE goal for this contract.

The construction project is located within the City of Richardson, and the City ordinances require the City Police Departments to dispatch its contracted wrecker service provider. City of Richardson has procured Signature Towing, Inc. as the wrecker service provider. In its role as RTC's fiscal agent, Executive Board approval will be requested to enter into a contract with Signature Towing, Inc., in an amount not to exceed \$374,000. The source of funding will be Surface Transportation Block Grant Program funding and 74,800 Transportation Development Credits in lieu of cash match.

Not only will MATA face increased ridership with the upcoming World Cup but Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART) has discontinued Route 209 which runs parallel with streetcar service. MATA is anticipating an increase in operating and maintenance to run longer hours. The RTC authorized funding for these items on November 13, 2025.

The RTC authorized RTC Local funding for NCT911 to implement Artificial Intelligence (AI) translation and transcription services for instant language processing capabilities. NCTCOG serves as the fiscal and administrative entity for NCT9-1-1. There is no local match required. Staff is requesting Executive Board approval, as the RTC's fiscal agent, to authorize \$200,000 in RTC Local funds for these activities, consistent with RTC action on November 13, 2025.

MATA will be utilizing Regional Toll Revenue (RTR) funds previously authorized for transit projects. Staff is requesting Executive Board approval to enter into an agreement with McKinney Avenue Transit Authority in an amount not to exceed \$800,000. There is no local match required. Fleet Improvements for Capital Projects will be \$500,000 and Enhanced Operations and Maintenance will be \$300,000. RTC also approved the use of \$400,000 in RTC Local funds for staff support related to the 2026 FIFA World Cup and other supportive planning activities.

A draft resolution approving the funding is attached for Executive Board consideration. I will be available to answer any questions the Board may have on this item.



Item Title: Resolution Endorsing the Dallas-Fort Worth Air Quality Improvement Plan:

Comprehensive Action Plan

In follow-up to a recent briefing on regional air quality challenges, staff will bring forward the *Dallas-Fort Worth Air Quality Improvement Plan (DFW AQIP): Comprehensive Action Plan* for Executive Board action. This plan has been developed through collaboration between the Transportation and Environment and Development Departments. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) has submitted a similar plan for the State.

In 2023, the NCTCOG received \$1 million in planning funds as part of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Climate Pollution Reduction Grant. NCTCOG used this funding to develop the Dallas-Fort Worth Air Quality Improvement Plan, which outlines a path toward comprehensive air quality improvement. The focus of these efforts is towards reducing local ozone pollution to address severe nonattainment issues while also addressing EPA's required elements related to estimates of carbon dioxide equivalence. NCTCOG submitted the *DFW AQIP: Priority Action Plan* to EPA in fulfillment of the first grant deliverable requirement upon approval by the Executive Board in February 2024. The *DFW AQIP: Priority Action Plan* outlined emissions and potential emissions reduction measures through 2030 across a variety of sectors including Water/Wastewater, Agriculture/Forestry/Land Use, Materials Management (solid waste), Energy, and Transportation. EPA has indicated that the plan met program requirements.

The EPA grant requires a second deliverable that provides a long-range approach through 2050 including additional information. NCTCOG has leveraged this requirement to develop a longer-range plan that aligns with other regional plans that look toward planning a 2050 horizon. The *DFW AQIP: Comprehensive Action Plan* expands on the previous deliverable by adding information about other emission sources, establishing emissions reduction targets, and providing a revised list of voluntary measures to meet the emissions reduction targets. Again, NCTCOG has established targets and measures in a manner that focuses on attaining federal ozone standards to improve local air quality, while addressing all EPA-required elements related to carbon dioxide equivalent emissions.

NCTCOG has been in continued coordination with TCEQ to ensure both the state plan and regional plan are complementary. The *DFW AQIP: Comprehensive Action Plan* is due to the EPA no later than December 1 to fulfill the grant obligation. Status reports monitoring progress toward implementation of measures will be due to EPA in future years.

WHEREAS, on February 7, 2024, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) finalized more stringent National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) for fine particulate matter, which may trigger nonattainment designations for Dallas and Tarrant Counties for the air pollutant fine particulate matter; and,

WHEREAS, NCTCOG has been designated as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Dallas-Fort Worth Metropolitan Area by the Governor of Texas in accordance with federal law; and,

WHEREAS, multiple NCTCOG committees, including the Public Works Council, Resource Conservation Council, Regional Integration of Sustainability Efforts (RISE) Coalition, Regional Transportation Council, and Water Resources Council, are committed to the development and implementation of policies, projects, and programs that support air quality improvement; and,

WHEREAS, the NCTCOG Executive Board authorized NCTCOG to submit a grant proposal requesting \$1 million in Planning Grants funding from the EPA Climate Pollution Reduction Grants Planning Grant program on April 27, 2023, and the proposal was subsequently awarded by EPA; and,

WHEREAS, the EPA Climate Pollution Reduction Grants Planning Grant presents an opportunity to develop a regional plan that achieves multipollutant emissions reductions and comprehensive air quality improvement, with focus on attainment of ozone standards; and,



Item Title: Resolution Approving Modifications to the FY2026 and FY2027

Unified Planning Work Program for Regional Transportation Planning

The Unified Planning Work Program for Regional Transportation Planning (UPWP) is required by federal and State transportation planning regulations and provides a summary of the transportation and related air quality planning tasks to be conducted by Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) staff. The FY2026 and FY2027 UPWP was approved by the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) and North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) Executive Board in July 2025 and identifies the activities to be carried out between October 1, 2025, and September 30, 2027. Modifications to the Work Program are being proposed and are noted below. The Regional Transportation Council approved the proposed modifications at its November 13, 2025, meeting.

The following modification reflects a new initiative proposed for inclusion in the Unified Planning Work Program that has not yet been approved by the Executive Board:

5.02 Subarea Studies and Local Government Assistance – Comprehensive Transportation Planning Studies and Technical Support (add Southwest Tarrant County/Southeast Parker County Roadway Connections as a new initiative for FY2026 and program \$64,000 in Transportation Planning Funds that were removed from Subtasks 5.01 Regional Transportation Studies – Corridor Studies/Environmental Studies Support [\$30,000] and 5.03 Land-Use/Transportation Initiatives – Sustainable Development Initiatives, General Land Use and Transportation Coordination [\$34,000])

The following modifications affect existing projects for which financial adjustments are being proposed:

- 3.03 Air Quality Management and Operations Car Care Safety Integration Project (remove initiative and \$122,000 in Regional Transportation Council Local funds due to a lack of responses to the Request for Proposals and a shift in priority to other air quality initiatives)
- 3.05 Transit Management and Operations Sustainability and Innovative Solutions for Transit (move \$235,000 in Regional Toll Revenue funds from FY2027 to FY2026 and program an additional \$337,500 in previously approved Regional Toll Revenue funds in FY2026 to support McKinney Avenue Transit Authority's 2026 World Cup readiness and operations)

3.05 Transit Management and Operations – Sustainability and Innovative Solutions for Transit (add \$200,000 in Regional Transportation Council Local funds in FY2026 and \$100,000 in FY2027 to offset funding reallocated to support the McKinney Avenue Transit Authority [MATA] during the 2026 World Cup)

- 5.03 Land-Use/Transportation Initiatives Transit-Oriented Development (add \$125,000 in Regional Transportation Council [RTC] Local funds in FY2026, as transitional funding pending receipt of federal authorization to begin spending funds)

Review

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) conducted a joint review of the metropolitan planning process in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metropolitan Area on June 4-6, 2025. This review is required at least once every four years for Transportation Management Areas, which are urbanized areas with a population over 200,000. The review consisted of a meeting with Regional Transportation Council members, public input with a 30-day comment period, and discussions with Transportation Department staff on various topics relating to the metropolitan planning process.

Based on overall findings, the Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration recertified the Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington, Denton-Lewisville and McKinney-Frisco Transportation Management Area planning process. Attached is correspondence from FHWA and FTA regarding the review, as well as additional information. A final report documenting the recommendations, commendations, and observations from the review is available from North Central Texas Council of Governments Transportation staff if desired. I will provide a brief summary of the report and be available to answer questions from the Board.

Item Title: Status Report on Interim Final Rule for the Disadvantaged Business

Enterprise Program

In August 2025, the Regional Transportation Council and Executive Board approved an overall Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Program goal of 8.6 percent for Fiscal Years 2026-2028 for U.S. Department of Transportation assisted contracting opportunities. During presentation of the goal, staff highlighted a pending United States Federal District Court case in Kentucky which could impact the DBE Program regulations in the future.

The U.S. Department of Transportation issued an Interim Final Rule on the DBE Program, which was published and became effective October 3, 2025. The interim Final Rule eliminates the sex and race-based presumptions to determine social and economic disadvantage. This requires all DBE firms to be recertified under the new rule. Staff will provide a summary of changes and impacts on the DBE Program.

NCTCOG DBE Program FY26-28

U.S. Department of Transportation Assisted Contracting Opportunities.

NCTCOG went through the standard process of the DBE goal update for 2026-2028, based on regulatory requirements at the time.

On August 7, 2025, and August 28, 2025, the RTC and Executive Board approved an updated goal of 8.6%.

The updated DBE goal was slated to go into effect on October 1, 2025.



DBE Program – USDOT Interim Final Rule

Context of DBE Interim Final Rule MID-AMERICA MILLING COMPANY VS. USDOT

(Case No. 3:23-cv-00072-GFVT)

Mid-America filed a lawsuit in the U.S. District Court in Eastern District of Kentucky in 2023 challenging the constitutionality of the DBE program.

Challenge is based on the use of race- and sex-based presumptions under the equal protection component of the Due Process Clause of the 5th Amendment.

May 28, 2025 - Joint Consent Order filed (not signed) with the Court.

June 25, 2025 – Solicitor General advised Speaker of the House that the DOJ concluded the DBE program's sex and race-based presumptions violate the constitution and would no longer defend these aspects in court.

As of November 2025, this court case is not resolved.



DBE Program - USDOT Interim Final Rule

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Release of DBF Interim Final Rule

October 1, 2025 – The USDOT posted a draft DBE Interim Final Rule (IFR) along with initial DOT guidance, dated September 30, 2025.

October 3, 2025 – The IFR was published to the Federal Register effective immediately with a public comment period of thirty (30) days.

October 22, 2025 – The USDOT issued additional guidance in the form of frequently asked questions.



DBE Program – USDOT Interim Final Rule

Significant Changes in Interim Final Rule

Recertification

All currently certified DBEs to be reevaluated. (timeframe unknown)

Race- and sex-based presumptions of social and economic disadvantage are eliminated.

Social and economic disadvantage to be demonstrated through individualized evidence.

Procurements Advertised, but not yet Awarded

DBE goals must be removed before award.

Contracts Already Executed

DBE commitments and participation cannot be counted toward goal attainment during re-certification period.

Future Procurements

No DBE goals may be included until Unified Certification Programs (UCPs) complete reevaluations.



DBE Program - USDOT Interim Final Rule

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Next Steps

UCPs will complete reevaluations of all DBE firms – no timeline provided for this effort.

NCTCOG communication to existing and pending contractors and subrecipients.

NCTCOG will continue to apply nondiscrimination clauses, prompt payment rules, and termination protections for subcontractors, as these provisions were not impacted by the IFR.

NCTCOG to update the DBE program and establish new goals, upon completion of re-certification process.

Item Title: Executive Director's Report: MetroX Regional Exercise Update

Public safety agencies across the Dallas-Fort Worth region took part in MetroX, a multi-day, full-scale emergency response exercise simulating terrorist attacks and mass casualty incidents across multiple cities. The three-day training event took place Oct. 27-29, 2025, and involved police and fire departments, emergency medical services, hospitals, school districts and universities, dispatch centers, emergency managers and city officials across the region. The purpose of the exercise was to test and strengthen regional preparedness, coordination and communication across all levels of emergency response.

The NCTCOG Emergency Preparedness department along with the Olsen Group, Ltd. led the year long planning effort, working with federal, state, and local officials to coordinate the various scenarios and sites for the exercise. Over 3000 people and 310 organizations and 84 volunteer organizations were involved in the exercise across 11 tactical sites, 12 Emergency Operations Centers, the Texas Division of Emergency Management Disaster District Emergency Operations Center, the Regional Support Center, 17 area hospitals, and 3 fusion centers in the North Texas area.


