




## North Central Texas Council of Governments Regional Model Construction Code Survey 2023 Results






## Does your city utilize the NCTCOG Regional Code Amendments?








## Does your city typically adopt NCTCOG's recommended amendments as published?






## Indicate the year of the code your city has most recently adopted (choose all that apply).




## Indicate the year of the code your city has most recently adopted (Cont'd).


#### What is your city's code adoption schedule?




## Option **A** amendments or Option **B** amendments?



# Some responses to why the city does not plan to adopt the 2021 International Green Construction Code (IGCC)

- "No way to enforce"
- "Not a town priority to enforce"
- "Overly costly and burdensome to development"
- "We adopt the state mandated IECC"
- "[Our city] is a very small city"
- "If an applicant wants to build a green building, they will be allowed to do so following the IGCC. The city will not require it."
