MOBILITY 2050: REGION'S NEXT LONG-RANGE PLAN OPEN FOR COMMENT



As the Regional Transportation Council prepares to consider the next long-range metropolitan transportation plan for the Dallas-Fort Worth area, residents can get a sneak peek at improvements planned over the next 25 years. The Mobility 2050 draft is available for review at NCTCOG.org/PlaninProgress. A blueprint for the future, Mobility 2050 proposes spending \$216.5 billion over the next 25 years, an increase of \$68 billion over Mobility 2045.

Mobility 2050 proposes spending:

• \$97.3 billion on roadways (freeways, tollways managed lanes and arterials)

- \$56 billion on bus and rail transit
- \$32.9 billion on maintenance
- \$23.9 billion on management and operations
- \$6.4 billion on strategic and policy initiatives

Tell us what you think of the recommendations in the draft plan by leaving a comment. Your feedback during this 30-day comment period is crucial to helping planners assess how the proposed policies, programs, and projects align with community needs. Additionally, NCTCOG will present information on the next long-range plan at the May 12 public meeting (see more below). The RTC is expected to consider adoption of Mobility 2050 in June. The plan will then be finalized and enter the conformity review period. Because Dallas-Fort Worth is in nonattainment for ozone pollution, the federal government must ensure the plan does not add to the region's ozone problem before it can be implemented.

Our virtual tool, <u>Map Your Experience</u> helps you remain involved in the planning process by gathering continuous input on transportation needs throughout the region from you and your neighbors. Whether you use the roads, rails, trails – or all of the above – you know how your own daily travel experiences may benefit from mobility and safety improvements. Help us continue planning by sharing with us how the region's transportation system could better serve you.

As one of the core documents maintained by NCTCOG as the region's metropolitan planning organization, the metropolitan transportation plan is required to have a planning horizon of 20-25 years.

Created by the League of American Bicyclists, this annual observance promotes the numerous perks of cycling. ENTERTAINMENT DISTRICT'S LATEST GEM HONORS AMERICA'S HEROES



The Regional Transportation Council took its April meeting on the road to a new facility honoring America's wartime heroes.

Arlington is accustomed to having the eyes of the entertainment world focused on it.

AT&T Stadium is not only the home of the Dallas Cowboys but has also hosted the

Super Bowl and college football and basketball national championships and countless

concerts since opening in 2009. In 2026, the stadium will welcome the best teams in

international soccer for nine FIFA World Cup matches. And don't forget the playoff and World Series baseball played at nearby Globe Life Field, home of the Texas Rangers.

Down the street from the professional stadiums is the city's latest gem to open its doors, the National Medal of Honor Museum, a place dedicated to telling the stories of the 3,528 recipients of the nation's highest military honor for valor. Current visitors to the museum can learn about a little more than 300 recipients. Over time, a rotation established by the museum will ensure the stories of the others are told.


The Regional Transportation Council took its April meeting on the road to a new facility honoring America's wartime heroes. The transportation policymaking body for the 12-county region approved \$1.9 million for sidewalks and other infrastructure outside the building.

The RTC has made a commitment to the Griffin Leadership Institute, dedicated to "inspire, equip, and connect people to live the values of the Medal of Honor, so that everyone can have a life of success and significance and realize the full potential of our nation, according to the museum's website.

Chris Cassidy, president and CEO of the National Medal of Honor Museum, thanked the RTC and North Central Texas Council of Governments for their support and touted the museum as a facility the entire nation can enjoy.

ELLIS COUNTY JUDGE NAMED NEXT EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



The NCTCOG Executive Board of has appointed Ellis County Judge Todd Little as the new executive director. Judge Little, who is expected to begin his duties in May, will succeed Mike Eastland, who is retiring after 32 years leading NCTCOG. As executive director, Judge Little will be responsible for managing the agency, supporting the Executive Board and overseeing the day-to-day activities of NCTCOG.

Judge Little is a third-generation resident of Ellis County and currently resides in Red Oak with his wife, Dawn, and their three children. He served as the mayor of Red Oak from 2000 to 2006 and holds a degree in financial planning from Baylor University. In July 2022, Judge Little was elected to the NCTCOG Executive Board, where he has had voting authority over policy, fiscal and vision-setting activities. Judge Little's role on the Executive Board and experience on the Workforce Development Board, upon which he has served since 2019, have prepared him well for his new role.

ACCESS NORTH TEXAS SURVEY OPEN THROUGH MAY



Help planners as they develop the next version Access North Texas, the 16-county region's public transportation coordination plan. Access North Texas will be updated in 2026, and public involvement is an important part of the process. Through May, NCTCOG is seeking participation in a survey from anyone wishing to assist in the updating of the plan. Another aspect of updating Access North Texas is coordination with stakeholders and transit customers to document transportation needs of older adults, individuals with disabilities, individuals with lower incomes, and others who may experience transportation challenges. The resulting plan will outline strategies to help address these needs and acts as a guide for local governments and transit agencies that would

like to implement services and/or initiatives to improve access to work, medical appointments, shopping, education, and community events.
