Background:

On September 11, 2023, TxDOT Headquarters staff briefed MPO partners statewide on its proposed policy to change allocation practices and limit carryover funding on certain MPO-selected categories, including Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ), Surface

Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program, and Category 2 - Metro Corridor funding. The result of this proposal is that MPOs will only have access to a portion of carryover funds. After carryover funds reach a certain percentage, the amount over the limit will be reallocated to other Districts and MPOs (in the case of CMAQ) or other Districts (in the case of STBG. but through the Category 2 funding program, and those funds would be selected by TxDOT Districts, not by MPOs). The same policy change proposal was presented at the September 28, 2023, Texas Transportation Commission (TTC) meeting, in which the TTC took action to send the proposed rule change through the public review and comment process. Comments are due by November 13, 2023. Staff briefed the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) in a special workshop during the October 2023 RTC meeting and sought feedback on a policy response. These partnerships involved funding projects for which Collin County Bond Program funds are ineligible in return for Collin County placing that local funding on the U.S. 380 corridor. An amended arrangement is being proposed that

Transportation Council (RTC) approval for the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) to pursue funding from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Electric Vehicle Charger Reliability and Accessibility Accelerator program and the use of RTC Local funds to satisfy match requirements for a State Energy Conservation Office (SECO)

project.

Background: As part of a set aside from the National Electric Vehicle

Infrastructure (NEVI) Formula Program, the FHWA's Electric Vehicle Charger Reliability and Accessibility Accelerator program will provide approximately \$100 million in funding for the repair and replacement of existing but non-operational publicly accessible electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure. FHWA has determined eligible non-operational EV charging infrastructure stations using the Alternative Fuels Data Center (AFDC) fueling

using the Alternative Fuels Data Center (AFDC) fueling station locator. Eligible sites located within the NCTCOG region are detailed in <u>Electronic Item 6.1</u>. Staff proposes to apply for the program to repair and replace eligible non-

operational electric vehicle chargers in or connecting travelers to the NCTCOG region, contingent on evaluation of site worthiness. NCTCOG has been awarded \$200,000 in Department of Energy (DOE) funds by SECO to continue regional energy management work, which is completed collaboratively by the NCTCOG Transportation and Environment and Development departments. This work has been ongoing for several years and seeks to further energy efficiency and renewable energy efforts in the region. These efforts are increasingly important as transportation electrifies, both in maintaining a reliable electric grid and mitigating increased air pollution from power generation. Receipt of \$200,000 federal funds requires a match of \$40,000. Both the award and match will be shared equally between departments. Up to \$20,000 RTC Local funds will be requested to fulfill the Transportation department share. Electronic Item 6.2 provides more information.

SIB loan from the Texas Department of Transportation

(TxDOT). This action freed up funds in the State Infrastructure Bank for use across Texas. Interest was earned at a rate of 4.2 percent with payments due on January 1, beginning 2014

and ending January 1, 2029. Payment in full was made early, October 2022, and the total amount of interest earned was \$38,897,636. Additional information is available in Electronic ltem 9.

The North Central Texas Council of Governments has received \$1 million from the CPRG Planning Grants to develop a regional plan to improve air quality. SURFACE TRANSPORTATION TECHNICAL COMMITTEE September 22, 2023

- 1. <u>Approval of August 25, 2023, Minutes</u>: The minutes of the August 25, 2023, meeting were approved as submitted in Electronic Item 1. Kelly Porter (M); Jim O'Connor (S). The motion passed unanimously.
- 2. **Consent Agenda**: The following items were included on the Consent Agenda:
 - 2.1. November 2023 Transportation Improvement Program Modifications: A recommendation was requested for Regional Transportation Council (RTC) approval of revisions to the 2023-2026 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), along with the ability to amend the Unified Planning Work Program and other planning documents with TIP-related changes. November 2023 revisions to the 2023-2026 TIP were provided in Electronic Item 2.1 for the Committee's consideration.
 - 2.2 Transit Strategic Partnerships Program: Selected Projects from the May 2023 Cycle: North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) staff requested the Committee's support for the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) recommendation for approval to provide funding in an amount not to exceed \$2,093,693 for the three projects selected through the Transit Strategic Partnerships Program May 2023 Cycle. As part of the program, staff is

recommending projects for Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funding under two programs: Section 5310 Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities Program and Section 5307 Urbanized Area Formula's Job Access/Reverse Commute Program. From the May 2023 Cycle of applicants, three projects have been selected for funding: 1 – Dynamic Direct Route pilot in the City of Arlington; 2 – Mobility Management in/to Collin County by the Denton County Transportation Authority; and 3 – Transit On-Demand Service provided by Trinity Metro in the City of Forest Hill. All projects align with the goals set forth in Mobility 2045. Electronic Item 2.2 contained more information.

A motion was made to recommend Regional Transportation Council approval of Items 2.1 and 2.2 on the Consent Agenda. Kelly Porter (M); Eron Linn (S). The motion passed unanimously.

3. Partnerships for Regional Events: Karla Windsor requested a recommendation for Regional Transportation Council (RTC's) approval of funds to support planning and infrastructure for upcoming regional events. These events will bring significant economic development to various parts of the region but present transportation challenges. The Dallas-Fort Worth area has national and international events coming to the region. In 2024, the Texas Rangers will host the Major League Baseball All-Star game. The region has also been selected to participate in the North American FIFA World Cup in 2026. Both events will be held in the Arlington Entertainment District. The funding needs and strategies: North Central Texas Council Of Governments (NCTCOG) gave an update to FIFA World Cup, formed subcommittees to identify needs for operations, transit, streetscape/safety, 50 electric vehicles requested to United States Department of Transportation, stakeholders from public and private sector involved. Staff recommended \$6 million for dynamic message signboards, software improvements, traffic signal enhancements, fiber, and Traffic Management Center (TMC) modifications. Transit recommends \$3 million for Trinity Railway Express (TRE) station improvements, bus staging, and enhanced transit capacity. Streetscape and safety recommended \$8 million for sidewalks, lighting, crossing improvements, and wayfinding/signage. A total of \$17.5 million in funding was requested with a \$500K cushion for cost overruns. Funding between NCTCOG and the City of Arlington will be exchanged for Randol Mill. There were \$17.5 million in local funds available for exchange of federal funds plus an interim asphalt overlay was needed for \$3.8 million in Regional Toll Revenue (RTR) and \$750,000 in Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds for dynamic message boards for Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT)/NCTCOG. An additional partner in need of assistance in preparing for an event that will affect transportation systems in areas with constrained access was presented. The Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base (NAS JRB) in Fort Worth will be hosting "Wings Over Cowtown" Air Show featuring the Blue Angels in April 2024 and is expecting 150,000 -180,000 spectators daily to access their facility off State Highway (SH) 183. Areas for assistance: parking on-base; regional park and ride lots such as Ridgemar Mall. Traffic analysis: base circulation and security protocols, increased transit support through Trinity Metro Route 91 connections to base entrance, Tex Rail North Side stop, TRE downtown (stations), connections to and from Ridgemar Mall, charter service/buses from regional park and ride lots with a total of \$250,000 in estimated costs. Additional details were provided in Electronic Item 3. Questions were asked during the item. John Polster, Denton County, "What were the source of the Regional Toll Revenue funds? What account?" Staff answered that they would need to get back with the answer. Kelly Porter with the City of Fort Worth asked, "Who would be receiving the funds for the Air Show". Staff answered that the funds would be coordinated through NCTCOG for the study and parking. Additional funding for

transit and charter services, if needed, would flow through NCTCOG to Trinity Metro and private companies that would be procured.

A motion was made to recommend Regional Transportation Council (RTC) approval of a \$17.5 million allocation of Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds to the City of Arlington, matched with Regional Transportation Development Credits (TDCs) in exchange for \$17.5 million of City "local" funds to be applied to projects identified within the Arlington Entertainment District, an allocation of \$3.8 million Regional Toll Revenue (RTR) funds to the City of Arlington for interim improvements on Randol Mill Road, an allocation of \$750,000 in federal funds to Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) for regional dynamic message signs, an allocation of \$250,000 RTC local to be allocated for transportation support for the NAS JRB Wings over Cowtown Air Show, and administratively amend Transportation Improvement Programs (TIP) and Statewide TIP, as well as other planning and administrative documents, to include the proposed project(s). Tim Palermo (M); Eron Linn (S). The motion passed unanimously.

4. Strengthening Mobility and Revolving Transportation Grant Endorsement: Ernest Huffman requested an endorsement for the Regional Transportation Council (RTC's) approval of North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) submission of Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) Grant Program applications. In October 2022, staff briefed the Council on the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) under the SMART program. The purpose of the grant is to demonstrate projects using technology interventions to solve real-world challenges, build data, technology capacity, and expertise in the public sector for funding of up to \$100 million per year. The first year in phase 1, will have 30-50 planning grants with \$2 million as a maximum grant with no local match. In the later years of phase 2, implementation grants of up to \$15 million. Ernest refreshed the Council with the status of the three projects from last year: project 1 – North Texas Micro-Weather Infrastructure for Advanced Air Mobility, pivoted to a 2023 submission with all Autonomous Vehicles as the focus and the City of Fort Worth as the applicant, project 2 – Flooded Roads Information System, NCTCOG to pursue another funding mechanism, and project 3 – Traffic Signal Technology and Deploying AI based Autonomous Traffic Management Systems (ATMS) Platforms, Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) pursuing via another mechanism. The 2023 proposed application submission on the North Texas Minimum Viable Unmanned Traffic Management Infrastructure for feasibility study to determine viability of regional solution for minimum viable Unmanned Traffic Management (UTM) Infrastructure to integrate into Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) UTM key site locations regionwide for \$2 million with no local match. The benefits of regionally owned and managed infrastructure that is required for drone operations to scale up to efficient Beyond Visual Line of Sight (BVLOS) Services. The remaining schedule: action requested at the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) meeting on September 14, 2023, the Surface Transportation Technical Committee (STTC) meeting on September 22, 2023, and the Executive Board meeting on September 28, 2023. The application deadline is October 10, 2023, at www.grants.gov. Electronic Item 4 contained additional details.

A motion was made to approve the endorsement for the Regional Transportation Council approval of the submittal of North Texas Minimum Viable Unmanned Traffic Management Infrastructure for funding consideration through the Fiscal Year 2023 Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) Program for \$2 million, and to administratively amend North Central Texas Council of Governments and State Transportation Improvement

Programs (TIP/STIP), as well as other planning and administrative documents, to include the proposed project if selected for an FY23 SMART Grant total award of \$2 million. Kelly Porter (M); Bryan Moen (S). The motion passed unanimously.

- 5. 2023 Transportation Conformity and Mobility 2050: Chris Klaus, presented for Jenny Narvaez, briefly highlighted several items for the Committee. He presented the overview of efforts on the 2023 Transportation Conformity analysis, including the reason for the analysis and the timeline. He also introduced the schedule of the next plan update (Mobility 2050). The purpose demonstrates that projected emissions from transportation projects are within emission limits (Motor Vehicle Emissions Budgets) established by the State Implementation Plan (SIP) and ensures federal funding and approval is applied to transportation projects that are consistent with air quality planning goals. Chris wanted to point out that we are in violation of two ozone standards, but what governs is the nonattainment area that is the largest, so the 2008 ozone standards for ≤ 75 parts per billion (ppb) is a ten-county nonattainment area, as compared to the 2015 ozone standard for ≤ 70 ppb is a nine-county nonattainment area. The difference is Rockwall County, the largest of the two govern so the analysis will be performed on the ten-county nonattainment area. In April of 2023, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) published a Notice of Adequacy for the 2020 Motor Vehicle Emissions Budgets for the purpose of transportation conformity with an effective date of May 24, 2023. This adequacy determination requires transportation conformity to be performed within two years of the effective date. Thus, staff will conduct a strategic analysis against new emission budgets only (no network/project changes to the current Mobility 2045 Update). The timeline: brought to the September 22, 2023, Surface Transportation Technical Committee (STTC) meeting and the October 12, 2023, RTC meeting for information, October 9, 2023, is the start of the comment period for the public meeting, will be taken for action at the October 27, 2023, STTC meeting, for action (Endorsement of 2023) Transportation Conformity) (End of Public Comment Period November 8, 2023) at the November 9, 2023, RTC meeting, for action (Endorsement of 2023 Transportation Conformity) at the November 16, 2023, Executive Board meeting. In November of 2023, the 2023 Transportation Conformity documents will be sent to federal and state partners to begin interagency consultation review with anticipated United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) conformity determination by March of 2024. Chris then highlighted a draft schedule for the region's next long range transportation plan update, Mobility 2050, including RTC adoption in June 2025 and USDOT conformity determination by December 2025. This schedule will ensure the mobility plan horizon to be at least 20 years into the future. Electronic Item 5 provided presented details.
- 6. 2023 Ozone Season Update: Nicholas Vanhaasen provided an update on the status of the 2023 ozone season including exceedance days, current design values, and future impacts facing the region. The Dallas-Fort Worth (DFW) nonattainment area is currently classified as "moderate" for the 2015 ozone standard with an attainment deadline in 2024 based on 2021, 2022, and 2023 monitor data. Since we are in a nonattainment area with two standards, we are looking at exceedances based off of the more stringent 2015 standard which is ≤ 70 ppb. As of September 21, we had 39 orange days and 8 red days, with a total of 47 exceedances. Preliminary monitor data indicates the area has failed to attain the 2015 standard and will likely be reclassified to "serious" in the future. A draft of the air quality plan for the "moderate" nonattainment has been prepared by the Texas Commission of Environmental Quality (TCEQ). Staff comments on the TCEQ draft plan are included in Electronic Item 6.1. In addition, the DFW nonattainment area is currently classified as "severe" for the 2008 ozone standard with an attainment deadline in 2027. Attainment will be based on 2024, 2025, and 2026 monitor data. If the region fails to attain the 2008 standard

by 2027, the region will be subject to annual penalty fees for stationary major sources of ozone precursors. It's estimated by TCEQ that the DFW area would incur \$45 million in fees in 2028. The program rules for the fees are under development by the TCEQ and are anticipated to be submitted by the TCEQ to the EPA for approval on November 7, 2025. Electronic Item 6.2 contained more information.

- 7. Director of Transportation Report on Selected Items: Michael Morris briefly announced he was asked to serve as a moderator at a conference and was at an event that recognized our State representative, Yvonne Davis. He highlighted several items for the Committee. He presented the insights that High-speed rail is picking up steam between Dallas and Houston, with Amtrak's interest. The Judge from Waller County and also the president of the Houston-Galveston Council of Governments wrote a letter, all of the correspondence is provided in Electronic Item 7.1. We have recently encountered some bumpiness from the City of Dallas regarding the High-Speed rail between Dallas and Fort Worth. Michael is anticipating correcting and addressing the concerns from the City of Dallas. He noted the program with the Universities for the North Texas Center for Mobility Technologies is proceeding. The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) staff have been attending a lot of public meetings including Transit East, Forest Hill Drive, and Fair Park. More information is available at: www.publicinput.com/fairparklinks. Michael announced High-Speed Rail is advancing with the hope to get into the environmental phase, where the purpose for the need will be published. Recent meeting and news regarding High-Speed Rail were provided in Electronic Item 7.2.
- 8. Regional Transit Version 2.0: Planning for Year 2050: Michael Morris requested a recommendation for Regional Transportation Council (RTC's) approval for the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) Transportation Director, who met with selected transportation authority cities concerned that cities often take their local transit issues to the Texas Legislature bypassing opportunities closer to home for resolution. Staff is recommending that RTC initiate a comprehensive transit study focused on advancing transportation authority collaboration between agencies and additional attention on expanding transit services to areas with transit needs, therefore, the consideration of Transit Version 2.0. Three major occurrences: most of the demographic growth is occurring outside of the transportation authority areas, solve misunderstandings at home, and restart our philosophy on transit by starting a whole new partnership based on new information and collaboration on what the best path forward to prepare our region on eleven and half million people. NCTCOG staff proposed seven initiatives: more aggressive transit, legislative program, increased membership, three agency cost savings, creating in-fill development, transit board teamwork, transit fare rewards program, and budget understanding (Paradox). Electronic Item 8.1 contained correspondence from cities following the meeting with the NCTCOG Transportation Director. Electronic Item 8.2 contained the draft white paper laying out the intent of the effort.

A motion was made to recommend Regional Transportation Council (RTC) approval of \$1 million in RTC local funds, a policy subcommittee for 12 Counties, addresses the seven areas presented, RTC requests North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) Executive Board select a consultant in November of 2023 or January 2024, the recommended consultant by NCTCOG /City/Transportation Authority (TA) staffs, legislative findings in August and/or September of 2024, final report by January 2025, and NCTCOG/TA reports will be available lowering consultant cost. Eron Linn (M); Kelly Porter (S). The motion passed unanimously.

9. **Fast Facts**: The following fast facts were provided by NCTCOG staff:

Camille Fountain highlighted the Fall 2023 Traffic Incident Management Executive Level Course Announcement for Thursday, November 2, 2023. Registration for the course was provided in Electronic Item 9.1.

Jared Wright highlighted the 14 projects funded using Congestion Mitigation Air Quality improvement funding in the Local Clean Air Spotlight provided in Electronic Item 9.2. For the Air Quality Funding Opportunities for Vehicles, Jared also provided an update that the TxDOT EV charging stations will open 56 charging stations statewide and the program is open until October 16, 2023, for phase one of the charging sites. Applications for the Electric Vehicle Charger Reliability and Accessibility Accelerator program opened on September 13, 2023, with availability of up to \$100 million in federal funding to repair and replace existing, electric vehicle charging infrastructure. More details provided at www.nctcog.org/aqfunding. Jared mentioned a few upcoming events, the Regional EV working group meeting on October 18, 2023, from 2:00 pm – 3:00 pm, via zoom. The National Drive Electric Week on Sunday, October 1, 2023, from 2:00 pm – 5:00 pm, at the Tanger Outlets in Fort Worth. The North Texas Facilities Expo is on October 4 and 5, 2023, from 8:40 am to 3:00 pm at 1200 Ballpark Way, Arlington, TX, 76011. 



We are taking measures to ensure the feasibility for the NCTCOG staff to continue with business as usual.







Federal Apportionment vs. Obligation Limitation



Apportionment

- Federal-aid highway funding; annually distributed to programs by a statutory formula
- Usually available for four years (current FY funds were apportioned + 3 years)
- Subject to carryover, lapses and expirations

Obligation Limitation

- Maximum amount of federal a state can obligate during a fiscal year, expires annually
- Not program specific; single amount
- Allows FHWA to be more responsive to budget policies



Additional Definitions



Obligation: Federal government's legal commitment to pay or reimburse entities for the Federal share of a project's eligible cost, via submission of Federal Project Authorization and Agreement (FPAA).

Advance Construction (AC): FHWA financial tool that allows TxDOT to request federal authorization present day, for <u>future obligation</u> when apportionment or Obligation Limitation is available.


Lapse: Most federal-aid funds <u>must be obligated</u> within four years (of being apportioned to the state); any unobligated apportionment will lapse and is no longer available for future projects.

Allocated Federal Funds: An administrative distribution of funds for programs that are not distributed to States by statutory formula. (ex. Earmark and Emergency Relief)

2023 August Redistribution Estimate - \$465M



August Redistribution allows states to return unused FY 2023 Obligation Limitation, so that others (such as Texas) may request the available Obligation Limitation and maximize federal obligations.



Benefits

- Ability to maximizes federal obligations by requesting additional obligation limitation
- Enables Texas to access apportionment current year and carryover balances.

Challenges

- Obligation Limitation does not carryover
- Redistributed amounts must be obligated by the end of fiscal year; need ready to let projects





TREND – MOVING AWAY FROM TXDOT/ MPO PARTNERSHIP TO CENTRAL CONTROL

- Lost Formula Allocation Minute Order
- Texas Transportation Commission (TTC) has moved funds to Category 12 vs. other categories
- Legislative debate (10% cap vs. 20% allocation)
- Partnership deal for Category 2 and Category 12 trade was reworked
- Now, new rulemaking

BACKGROUND

- In 1991, federal law established Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) selection authority for Surface Transportation Planning – Metropolitan Mobility funds, which were later renamed Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds
- Congestion Mitigation Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) funds are allocated to nonattainment areas and for decades the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has delegated selection authority to MPOs
- TxDOT Headquarters has been focused on the reduction of carryover balances in MPO-Selected categories for several years
- Led to the creation of the Regional Transportation Council (RTC)'s 10 Year
 Milestone Policy and annual project tracking efforts implemented by staff



BACKGROUND, CONT.

- Per federal law, funds are available in the year of apportionment, plus 3 years (4 years total)
- This means funds can carryover legally for up to 3 years, then they lapse
- The only lapse in our history was in FY 2020, when TxDOT allowed funds to lapse by not spending the oldest funds first (not caused by an MPO)
- TxDOT is using this lapse as a reason to pursue removal of funds from MPO selection and transitioning it to TxDOT District selection

LET'S REMEMBER THE CIRCUMSTANCES SURROUNDING THE LAPSE

- April 12, 2021 TxDOT notified the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG)
 via letter that \$23,940,109 of federal CMAQ funding had lapsed at the end of FY2020
- FY2020 year end documentation from TxDOT showed a FY2020 carryover balance of \$16,414,535 federal (with \$8 million already slotted for projects)
 - This means we lost more money in the lapse than TxDOT had previously communicated that we had available
 - And, \$8 million was already pre-approved by our federal partners for use & TxDOT did not pull
 the trigger to use them on time
- Our historical understanding was that TxDOT spent the oldest funding first on a "first in, first out" basis
- TxDOT stopped this practice at some point, not realizing the ramifications
- Using lapsed funds as a justification for this policy change is inaccurate
- The mistake made in the previous lapse could still happen under this new rule

PROPOSED RULEMAKING – STBG FUNDS

- A portion of STBG funds are federally allocated to urbanized areas over 200,000 in population (e.g., MPOs) and cannot be reallocated to other areas of the State
- TxDOT is proposing that if MPO carryover balances exceed 200% of a given year's annual allocation, they would sweep the amount over the 200% threshold from the MPO's Category 2 allocation
- This means that TxDOT is only allowing 2 years of use (the year of apportionment plus 1) vs. the federal rule of year of apportionment plus 3
- Since TxDOT cannot reallocate STBG funds, they are proposing to reallocate other MPO-selected funds via the Category 2 program
- Potential problem with federal legislative intent

PROPOSED RULEMAKING – STBG FUNDS

- In the Texas Administrative Code, Category 2 is allocated to MPOs currently
- The proposed rule states that Category 2 funds will be allocated to MPOs and Districts
- This changes selection authority for ALL category 2 funding, not just the future "STBG-related Category 2 adjustments"
 - Staff recommendation: We should comment on this point

PROPOSED RULEMAKING – CMAQ FUNDS

- CMAQ Funds are allocated to States based on nonattainment areas
- TxDOT has historically suballocated CMAQ funds to MPOs in nonattainment areas for air quality conformity purposes
- The proposed rule change states that if MPO carryover balances exceed 200% of the annual allocation, the amount over the threshold will be reallocated to TxDOT District Category 11 Safety Program
- In addition, TxDOT is proposing that MPOs must obtain District concurrence on <u>ALL</u> CMAQ funds, not just funds reallocated to Districts
 - Staff recommendation: We should comment on this point



PROPOSED RULEMAKING - GENERAL

- Removal of funds from MPO to TxDOT selection authority is proposed to happen at the staff level vs. by the TTC
- This means that MPO allocations can be reduced with:
 - No public involvement
 - No transparency
- TTC approves the Unified Transportation Program (UTP), funding allocations, and Major Changes to the UTP
 - Under this proposal, removal of MPO funds is not considered to be a "Major Change"
- Proposed Comments
 - If TxDOT is going to take funding away from MPOs, it should occur via a formal TTC action
 - Notification should be sent to MPOs and MPO policy boards in advance
 - An appeals process should be created to review data to ensure accuracy and context

PROPOSED RULEMAKING - IMPLEMENTATION

- Annually, TxDOT will review carryover balances and judge those against how much of the funding the MPOs have "encumbered" (in late October)
- TxDOT Headquarters will create report of carryover balance and planned use of the funds for Districts and MPOs
- The amount they will "take" is the amount that is "unencumbered"
- TxDOT Headquarters will present draft UTP distribution to the TTC in January of the following year
- TxDOT leadership will then consider implementing the 200% threshold rule

ISSUES

- The rule does not define "encumbered" or "unencumbered"
- TxDOT has two possible information systems to use:
 - 1. the eSTIP (moving from)
 - 2. TxDOT Connect (moving to)
- The eSTIP is the mechanism available for MPOs to track/monitor/communicate programmed funding to projects to the public, TxDOT, and the US Department of Transportation (US DOT)
- TxDOT Connect is TxDOT's internal database
 - MPOs have read only access
 - Districts and other TxDOT staff have "write" access



ISSUES

- The Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) is <u>the</u> federally recognized tracking system for transportation projects and funding
 - TIP/STIP modifications are reviewed by TxDOT Districts and the US DOT
 - The eSTIP revision process is long and complicated
- TxDOT pulls data from TxDOT Connect
 - TxDOT District staff have to re-enter projects, funding, and dates into TxDOT Connect
 - TxDOT does not "automatically" include MPO awarded projects into the same fiscal year as the MPO allocates them
 - Projects have to be coded correctly in TxDOT Connect to show up in the TxDOT Headquarters data pulls
 - In 2023, transit transfers that had already been <u>finalized</u> were not showing up in the analysis TxDOT was using for this process.



ISSUES

- TxDOT uses a "Category Analysis" to track allocated funds, carryover funds, and usage of such funds
- The Category Analysis report feeds from TxDOT Connect
- The programmed amounts in the Category Analysis reports often do not match the data provided in monthly Federal Obligation Reports that TxDOT provides MPOs
- Also, the reports use different fiscal years (State vs. Federal)

BY THE NUMBERS

- Total funding in the 2024 UTP is \$100,565,592,319
 - \$80,336,338,956 is TxDOT selected
 - \$20,229,553,363 is MPO selected (CMAQ, STBG, TASA, Cat 2)
- Possible carryover removal from MPOs to TxDOT (based on draft FY2023 obligation levels):
 - \$263.43M (CMAQ and STBG)
 - 0.26% of total funding in the UTP
- If the number being quoted is true, the percentage of carryover funding is miniscule compared to the balance of funding in the UTP
- Does not address growing problem of Category 12 balances



WHAT CAUSES PROJECT DELAYS

- STIP Exceptions Projects not immediately approved in the STIP or STIP revision process
- Federal Functional Classification Amendments required to use federal funds on a corridor
 - RTC submitted amendments to TxDOT Headquarters in 2018 that were never processed, had to be resubmitted in 2022, and some of which are still pending
 - Additional projects submitted in 2002 are still pending FFCS approval
- Advance Funding Agreements (AFA) between TxDOT and implementing agencies take 6 to 8 months minimum, sometimes in excess of 12-24 months, for execution
- Local government changes in priority, staff turnover, etc.
- The federal process itself is cumbersome

IMPLICATIONS OF THE PROPOSED CHANGE

- TxDOT asserts that it is creating an incentive = Use it or lose it
- Implications of Districts having veto authority over CMAQ and Category 2 funding?
- How to define "unencumbered" funds?
 - Not defined in the rulemaking, therefore, cannot independently verify
 - Rulemaking does not specify data source to be used
- TxDOT is using an incomplete information system that indicates a problem that may or may not be true, and it is a system that we cannot update

POINTS TO CONSIDER

- Historically, TxDOT and MPOs coordinated and worked on solutions to ensure timely use of federal funds via "trade fairs"
- TxDOT has moved away from that model and is proposing to remove
 MPOs from the selection authority process instead
 - TxDOT is not trying to understand the reasons that projects get delayed or work toward solutions to fix the problems
 - Instead, their goal seems to be to remove funding from MPOs and transfer selection authority back to TxDOT
- Since this rulemaking is long-term, we cannot base our decisions upon our current relationship with the Districts

CMAQ AND AIR QUALITY – THE TIES THAT BIND

- MPOs are responsible for air quality conformity in the regions
- Congress has developed CMAQ as a revenue source to aid in the implementation of projects that improve air quality
- MPOs prioritize CMAQ funds to ensure sanctions are not implemented on the State and Region
- This proposed rule sets a perilous precedent risking sanctions that can halt roadway project implementation
- TxDOT may use the funds for items that are technically eligible, but do not have a large impact on achieving air quality standards
- Unintended consequences include a loss of CMAQ funds due to actions (or inaction) of the District, not the MPO

HOW TO RESPOND

Level 1:

- Do little, let it happen (they are not going to listen anyways)
- We will be laser focused to never hit those caps
- Assume current relationship with Districts is maintained and impacts to our region will be minimal

Level 2:

 Provide comments, draft rules have fatal flaws (we cannot assume local TxDOT partnership will always exist)

- The rule is silent on information system used, and if TxDOT Connect is used, two systems of record are available (eSTIP is officially sanctioned) and not usually consistent
- Ask TxDOT to confirm compliance with federal intent

BACKGROUND

- NCTCOG would like to expand the pool of RTC Local funds available to implement projects outside of the longer federal process.
- The RTC Local pool was previously expanded via federal/local exchanges with various local partners.
- The latest example was a federal/local trade between the RTC and the City of Dallas (Five Mile Creek Trail Partnership) approved in June 2023, with the funds received in October 2023.
- To further increase the amount of non-federal funding available to the RTC, staff proposes to build upon the original two-project partnership with Collin County that was approved in November 2020.

ORIGINAL PARTNERSHIP WITH COLLIN COUNTY, FRISCO, AND MCKINNEY

- In November 2020, two projects were funded by the RTC because Collin County Bond funds were ineligible, yet the County had an interest in participating financially:
 - Panther Creek Parkway (Frisco) \$30 million Surface Transportation Block Grant
 - McKinney National Airport Runway Extension (McKinney) \$30 million Regional Toll Revenue
- In exchange, \$60 million of RTC-selected Category 2 funds were taken off the US 380 project and replaced with \$60 million of Collin County Bond funds.

CURRENT PROPOSED TRADE WITH COLLIN COUNTY

- Collin County has already committed \$60 million in local bond program funds to US 380 to complete the existing partnership agreement.
- The County is willing to send its \$60 million of local funds to the RTC instead if the RTC will place the same amount of new Category 2 funds on US 380.
- The \$60 million of County funds would be added to the RTC Local pool.

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
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
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2023 TRANSPORTATION CONFORMITY ANALYSIS







Charging stations must display price before initiating in session in \$/kWh and cannot change during a session

Charging stations must include a contactless payment method that accepts all major debit and credit cards and the option to pay by toll-free phone number or SMS message system

Charging stations must meet interoperability standards regarding communication protocols between vehicles and charging networks



North Texas Center for Mobility Technologies Sponsored Research Project Funding Report

Advanced Air Mobility/Urban Air Mobility System Within the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex (NTXAAMPP)

Background

In 2020, as part of the region's effort to host a hyperloop certification center, the RTC approved \$2.5 million in seed money to help support local university research projects advancing mobility solutions. Four DFW research universities—UTA, UNT, UTD, and SMU—established the North Texas Center for Mobility Technologies in conjunction with the Texas Research Alliance, a project of the Richardson and Dallas Regional Chambers.

Typically, a research project related to mobility technologies is proposed by a company and a university research partner. The project is vetted through the NTCMT and, if deemed worthy, advanced to NCTCOG with a recommendation for NCTCOG seed funding. Subject matter experts on NCTCOG staff review each proposal before NCTCOG funding is approved. Projects that meet one or more regional goals adopted by the RTC are eligible for funding with the approval of the Transportation Director:

- Improved access to jobs and other destinations
- Environmental protection/resiliency
- Economic development
- Equity
- Technology innovation leadership

The model is for research project sponsors to contribute approximately 50 percent of the cost of approved projects, with NCTCOG and the university research project lead each contributing approximately 25 percent. The RTC directed the Transportation Director to report to the Surface Transportation Technical Committee and the Regional Transportation Council on research projects for which NCTCOG funding was approved.

Below is a description of a sponsored research project that has been approved for NCTCOG funding:

Project Overview

<u>Project Title</u>: Advanced Air Mobility/Urban Air Mobility System Within the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex

<u>Summary</u>: The purpose of the project is to investigate the challenges in creating an aircorridor, investigate uncertainties due to weather, existing traffic, and quality of

communications among others. The proposed first-of-a-kind air corridor stretches 25 miles from the Alliance Mobility Innovation Zone (MIZ) to Discovery Park at UNT in Denton and will facilitate the uncrewed transportation of passengers and cargo. The project aims to achieve a successful multi-aircraft test flight and will provide a written report on the architecture of the system alongside an assessment of performance during simulations and all live flight exercises.

Technical Approach

NASA's National Campaign (NC) informs the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) introduction of the Advanced Air Mobility class of aviation assets. This project contributes to the NC by developing infrastructure to cross-certify e-VTOL aircraft for civilian use, in conjunction with the United States Air Force AFWORX program. NTCMT 1-2022 will develop the first National AAM Air Track system and will be the primary trail system for the NC program moving forward. The system also interfaces with technology born out of a previous NTCMT project (NTCMT 2-2021) and deploys the Airspace Hazard Identification and Alerting Service (AHAS), which provides for a safer, more efficient, and more robust network communication solution compared to previous approaches. Below is a proposed list of tasks for this project:

- Task 1: Kick-Off Meeting & Subcontractors Signature (All subcontractors on agreed terms and signed subcontracts)
- Task 2: Simulator Test Report (Written report on updated X4+/NC2 architecture performance in simulation)
- Task 3: Initial Flight Test Report (Written report on updated X4+/NC2 architecture performance in live flight)
- Task 4: Deployable Simulation Report (Written report on updated DIOXIDE architecture performance in simulation)
- Task 5: Deployable Flight Test Report (Written report on updated DIOXIDE architecture performance in multi-aircraft live flight)
- Task 6: Final Report (Written Report on Program Results and Commercialization Options)

Impacts of the Research:

The project will deliver advancements in dedicated AAM air corridor infrastructure, technology, software, deployment strategies, and communications protocols, while leveraging partnerships with NASA to yield the nation's first AAM Air Track system. Furthermore, this project bolsters a myriad of small businesses and further establishes the DFW metroplex as a premier global destination for uncrewed aerial vehicle research and development.

Dear Ms. McNeal:

I hope this letter finds you doing well. You may recall we met on February 23, 2023, when you & Administrator Amit Bose visited Houston and the Houston Galveston Area Council (HGAC) to talk about the Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act. I am currently serving as the Chairman of the Board for HGAC in addition to my primary role as County Judge of Waller County, Texas.

Waller County is one of eight counties between Houston and Dallas that will be adversely impacted by the Houston to Dallas High Speed Rail Project. Unfortunately up to this point, there has been almost no meaningful coordination with local communities in any of these counties regarding the potential impacts this project could have on our respective areas, including but not limited to, drainage and flooding, emergency services, public safety, historical and cultural impacts, school district impacts, economic development and impacts on counties and cities' tax bases, wildlife and endangered species, and environmental justice issues for low income areas. I raised this issue during the meeting, and I spoke with you briefly afterward.

Recently, Amtrak released a statement that they are joining with Texas Central to further the development high speed rail service between Dallas and Houston. This did not come as a surprise to me, because I had become aware that Amtrak was partnering with the NCTCOG and TCR as early as March, when the NCTCOG submitted a grant application to the FRA for the

Corridor Identification and Development Program, identifying the Houston to Dallas corridor along with Dallas to Fort Worth as one corridor. What has become especially troubling and disconcerting to me as County Judge, and as the Chairman of HGAC, is that this was submitted without any notice to the three (3) other Councils of Government that have communities that will be directly impacted by this project, which include the Brazos Valley Council of Government and the Heart of Texas Council of Government, in addition to HGAC. None of these COGs have submitted a letter of support on this grant application, and had they been given an opportunity, they might have chosen to send a letter expressing opposition instead. It is very disappointing that the NCTCOG submitted an application advocating to identify a corridor, the majority of which is outside of their jurisdiction and without notice to counties or COGs that are actually physically impacted.

What is even more distressing is that records recently obtained from the NCTCOG seem to indicate that persons involved with the potential partnership between Amtrak, TCR, and NCTCOG have intentionally kept the relationship out of the public eye, indicating a substantial lack of transparency. Meanwhile, since last year when TCR's CEO Carlos Aguilar abruptly resigned and their board of directors disbanded, it has become increasingly difficult to get TCR to provide the public with any information on who is making decisions for TCR. In the most recent press release by Amtrak, there was a statement attributed to Michael Bui, as the Chief Executive Officer of TCR. Concerned about many of these issues, I met with NCTCOG Executive Director Mike Eastland and Director of Transportation Michal Morris on July 24, 2023 at NCTCOG's offices in Arlington, Texas. Joining me at that meeting were Judge Joe Fauth of Grimes County and Judge Todd Little of Ellis County. When I asked both Mr. Eastland and Mr. Morris if they knew Michael Bui, they both responded that they did not know that name, despite having Texas Central listed on their application to the FRA. Mr. Bui testified earlier this year in front of the Transportation Committee of the Texas House on HB 2357, which is described further below in this letter. You will find Michael Bui's testimony at the following link, along with some scathing comments from Chairman Canales and other Committee members, regarding TCR's lack of transparency, which can be viewed here starting at the 25:00 mark: https://tlchouse.granicus.com/MediaPlayer.php?view_id=78&clip_id=24771

Furthermore, myself and many folks between Houston and Dallas are very alarmed in relation to Amtrak's announcement because of the risk to taxpayers. For over ten (10) years now, the Dallas-Houston HSR project has been touted as a "privately financed project" that would not involve any public tax dollars. The entire Environmental Review process conducted by the FRA during this time period was premised on this project being privately financed. On multiple occasions, I and others requested that the FRA take a hard look at the feasibility of this project because we were concerned that the numbers did not make sense, in terms of viability. It should be noted that this was originally proposed as a \$12B project, and that estimate has now grown to somewhere between \$35-40B+. The project did not seem to even cash flow at \$12B, much less at \$35B+. Every time we raised this issue, the response from the FRA was that there was no need to examine feasibility because the project was **privately financed**. Now, with Amtrak involved, public tax dollars are now at risk. Amtrak lost \$2B last year and TCR, until now, has appeared to be defunct, having been delinquent in 2022 and 2023 in paying property taxes on properties they own in the counties between Houston and Dallas. I believe that the FRA

should exercise extreme caution in regards to this project. As has been stated before, if caution is not exercised with this project, it could fail so catastrophically, that it will negatively impact potential HSR projects elsewhere that are feasible and make sense.

I also firmly believe that Amtrak may attempt to make use of the Environmental Impact Statement that was approved and published by the FRA over three (3) years ago. I was personally involved in Waller County's effort to get substantive coordination with the FRA from 2014-2018 through the Waller County Sub-Regional Planning Commission, and I can honestly say that during that time period, the FRA did not engage in any meaningful coordination with any of the counties or communities between Houston and Dallas that were impacted by this project. I have all of this very well-documented. We even provided a complete list of significant impacts and analysis thereof to the Texas Department of Transportation, the only agency that responded and met with County representatives in May of 2016. At that time, TXDOT was listed as a co-lead agency on the Dallas - Houston HSR Project. A copy of a document identifying and discussing impacts to Waller County and the FRA's failure to analyze all potential corridors for the project pursuant to NEPA (a copy of which is attached hereto) was provided to TXDOT and we requested that this information be provided to the FRA, as the FRA had declined our invitation to meet and coordinate. TXDOT subsequently confirmed that this information was provided to the FRA, yet none of the impacts described in our coordination meeting were even referenced in the EIS that was eventually approved, including very real public safety issues not considered. Subsequently, TCR removed TXDOT as a co-lead agency on the project. Presumably because they were complying with Texas law and actually coordinating with Waller County.

Further, to allow an EIS to be utilized when the basic premise as to the financing of the project has changed (going from privately financed to publicly financed) would be an injustice in and of itself. It is imperative that a new EIS should be performed. Due to the previous environmental review process being premised on private financing, there could be numerous individuals and agencies from throughout the country that may have public comments or feedback on the use of public tax dollars on this venture. Other HSR projects from other areas of the country may have opinions or comments on this project, given the fact that many of them are competing for allocated federal funds for HSR. Further, now that public tax dollars are involved, the FRA should also examine feasibility of this project which should be addressed in a new environmental review process. Waller County is now one of the fastest growing counties in Texas as well. I would further argue that the EIS which was approved well over three (3) years ago is already outdated. Circumstances and development dictate that Amtrak and TCR should begin the process from the beginning, with a programmatic analysis of alternative corridor routes, including but not limited to, right of way along Interstate 45 between Houston and Dallas.

There has been and continues to this day to be, an issue with transparency in regards to this project, despite claims made by TCR otherwise. After failing to get any information from TCR for several months, Rep. Cody Harris introduced House Bill 2357, which would have required TCR to provide the same information to TXDOT that is currently provided to the FRA (information regarding corporate structure, governance, project costs, funding, etc). HB 2357 was passed out of the House Transportation Committee, but was killed by Dallas State Representative Yvonne Davis when the bill was placed on the Consent Calendar. Emails

obtained from the NCTCOG indicate that NCTCOG employees had numerous conversations with Rep. Davis' office in relation to HB 2357, which Rep. Davis later killed. Taxpayers and landowners deserve transparency at all levels of government, and especially with infrastructure projects of this nature. Anything less should not be tolerated.

For these reasons, I would like to travel to Washington DC in the next few weeks and meet with FRA officials, including Administrator Bose, so that I can provide further details and background into issues discussed in this letter. 

I received a copy of your recent letter to Ms. Sabrina McNeal, Federal Railroad Administration - U.S. Department of Transportation regarding the proposed Houston to Dallas High Speed Rail Project. In the letter you reference my actions during the Texas House of Representatives consideration of House Bill 2357 during the 88th Regular Session of the Texas Legislature.

The purpose of this letter is to address the overly broad mischaracterization of my concerns with the passage of House Bill 2357. As I mentioned during the consideration of the proposed legislation, Texas should actively consider and encourage all modes of transportation to ensure sufficient and sustainable transportation infrastructure as our state continues to grow. I also agreed, Texans deserve transparency as the state considers all potential transportation options to meet the state's current and future needs. However, we should not overregulate the process that would deter or limit future investors and/or options. In my opinion, House Bill 2357 would have drastically limited potential interest and options ever being considered to meet the growing mobility demands of our state.

Finally, you indicated that my actions were the result of conversations with individuals associated with the North Central Texas Council of Governments. As the senior member of the House Transportation Committee, I am keenly aware of the continued need for and the importance of developing a strategic plan to address the safety, reliability, and resiliency of the state's transportation infrastructure — whether that's electric cars, autonomous cars, high speed rail or other modes of transportation. I consider all information received and/or presented when legislation is considered before the Transportation Committee. My consideration of House Bill 2357 was no different!

This letter is in response to your recent correspondence to Ms. Sabrina McNeal, Federal Railroad Administration - U.S. Department of Transportation regarding the proposed Houston to Dallas High Speed Rail Project. It appears you may have inadvertently failed to copy the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG), as you made several references to NCTCOG and its activities which are incorrect and NCTCOG wishes to clarify.

First and foremost, your assertion that NCTCOG has collaborated with Texas Central Partners (TCP Holding Company) or Amtrak in private or intentionally kept such discussions out of the public eye is not accurate. With respect to the Corridor Identification and Development Program, it was an application to connect two already well-known High Speed Rail Corridors into one seamless project, with a "one seat ride". The connection was solely in the Dallas-Fort Worth region. NCTCOG's application was presented for action at three (3) separate open meetings in the January 2023 – March 2023 timeframe, including the Surface Transportation Technical Committee, Regional Transportation Council and Executive Board. It was not until after NCTCOG had prepared its submittal that it learned TCP and Amtrak were seeking letters of support for a separate program. NCTCOG is committed to supporting both the Houston to Dallas and Dallas to Fort Worth high speed rail projects, irrespective of what entity or entities build and/or operate them. I encourage you to read the enclosed *High Speed Rail Version 2.0* column by Michael Morris, NCTCOG Director of Transportation for additional context.

NCTCOG, similarly to the Houston Galveston Area Council (HGAC) which you mention you currently serve as Chairman of the Board, has a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with TCP for activities related to the Houston to Dallas corridor. The project has also been approved by the respective metropolitan planning organization policy bodies and included in both the NCTCOG and HGAC long-range transportation plans. In each instance, the projects have been publicly presented and discussed numerous times. Lastly, communication with Representative Davis and her staff was focused entirely on providing education and responding to questions on a broad range of transportation related issues as well as other topics, as NCTCOG routinely does with many elected officials. At no time did NCTCOG staff attempt to influence any legislators' vote on a particular piece of pending legislation.

With regard to Amtrak, extensive conversation occurred on maintaining at-grade service between DFW and Oklahoma City and initiating at-grade service between DFW and Atlanta. No conversation occurred on high speed rail. In addition, we do not know Mr. Bui.



Opinions of Ordinary Texans Needed to Make High-Speed Trains Reality

Recent media communication in Texas is trending around the subject of high-speed rail between Houston and Dallas. The question most often raised is what is the status of Texas Central Partners and its proposed high-speed rail project? Perhaps a more important question is, as Texans, what is our interest in continuing to pursue high-speed rail corridors. Can our voices be heard? Whether you are for or against it, your voice is needed now in order to explore the future of high-speed rail under an updated vision. What if the vision eliminated fatalities, mitigated hurricane evacuation challenges and had the public own the right-of-way? What if high-speed rail met your desires?

High Speed Rail: Existing Version 1.0

In the mid-1980s, Japanese Railway and Japanese bank interests came to Texas to explore high-speed rail between Dallas and Fort Worth but did not pursue it to fruition. Since that time, federal, state and private sector interests have continued to explore high-speed opportunities in corridors across the country. Frequent studies and analyses have concluded a need for a high-speed rail connection between Dallas and Houston. The Federal Railroad Administration began requesting states to provide high-speed rail plans. In Texas, private-sector interest re-surfaced in 2009 focusing on the Houston to Dallas line. The Japanese reentered the conversation and eventually decided to form Texas Central Partners. Environmental studies have advanced, legal questions appear answered, and private sector ownership of rail right-of-way remains. The very positive aspects of this effort are the proposed development of a world class project that will reduce highway congestion, offer exceptional travel times between the two large metropolitan areas and reduce harmful mobile air emissions.

A limiting factor is a technology that restricts other providers to

use the corridor, which prevents a competitive market from forming. Also, there continues to be a concern that a workable business plan has yet to materialize and right-of-way is still privately owned.

High Speed Rail: Existing Version 2.0

There have been many new opportunities that have emerged along with many advances in the high-speed rail arena over the past 15 years. A proposed high-speed rail line project between Fort Worth-Arlington-Dallas is entering the environmental review phase. Connecting this line to the Dallasto-Houston route presents an opportunity to expand rail service from Fort Worth to Houston as a "one seat" ride, no need to transfer. Plus, current planning is underway to look at the feasibility of creating a branch-off point of this line that would connect to Austin and on to San Antonio. By planning for the new connection points now, there is

the opportunity to reduce overall long-term costs. This new vision is a major reason for introducing High-Speed Rail Version 2.0 as an alternative to Version 1.0.

Version 2.0 also helps foster the emergence of a megaregion by better connecting the major population centers of Texas and thereby creating super economies and maximizing gross domestic product though the resulting synergy. The concept of megaregions has been around for several years but a new book published in 2022, Megaregions and America's Future, gives the reader a deeper understanding of how the economics work to create these better results.

Under this newly proposed version, the rail lines would be publicly owned with the private sector being responsible for providing and operating the vehicles. Rather than one company having exclusive rights to the rail lines, it is envisioned that it would operate more like airports, which allow for many carriers. Thus, the traveling public could benefit from a competitive marketplace.

Below is a list of factors that need to be remembered as you consider your interest in the value of high-speed rail:

It can deliver consistent and reliable travel times compared to the intercity freeway system, which is often affected by congestion, traffic accidents and other automobile related incidents. It can speed up hurricane evacuation operations which are an ever-growing challenge due to the rapidly increasing population of south Texas and an increased frequency of weather events.

Its safety record is much better than that of automobile related travel which produces a staggering number of deaths each year. It also complements the State's Vision Zero Program which is focused on reducing deaths from automobile accidents.

It makes advanced medical services more readily available by providing easier access to specialized care that is being developed and delivered in each of these large metropolitan regions.

It can also be used to move light weight, high-end goods as well as people and, thereby, create more roadway capacity for high-volume freight movement by traditional rail and intercity trucks.

Funding options today are very different than those of the past. New federal legislation provides tax and fee supported funding for which high-speed rail is eligible. Getting our fair share should be an imperative, especially if Texans own the right-of-way.

As referenced, having multiple rail providers in Version 2.0 brings greater competition enhancing consumer protections similar to our airports. In addition, a new business model using latest federal funding tools, and potential State surpluses, creates an opportunity to assist land owners with additional royalty payments.

Agree or disagree with high-speed rail, but don't be silent. However, I believe we have a chance to take ownership of this decision and lead our State and nation to a new future – one where high-speed rail is transformed from concept to reality. What are your ideas?

As the Metropolitan Planning Organization for the Dallas-Fort Worth area, the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) developed Traffic Incident Management (TIM) Training courses to initiate a common, coordinated response to traffic incidents that will build partnerships, enhance safety for emergency personnel, reduce upstream traffic crashes, improve the efficiency of the transportation system, and improve air quality in the Dallas-Fort Worth region. In 2022, the 16-county Dallas-Fort Worth region experienced 128,228 total reportable crashes, of which 21,554 were injury crashes, and 833 were fatal crashes. These statistics prove that training for agencies responsible for managing and clearing traffic incidents continues to be extremely important and is needed to improve responder and motorist safety and to significantly reduce the length and size of roadway closures.

Since February 2003, 133 classes have been offered at the first responder level to 3,574 students in the areas of police, fire, department of public safety, towing, EMS, Mobility Assistance Patrol, transportation agencies, and media representatives. Additionally, since February 2005, 35 classes have been offered at the executive level to 1,322 decision and policy makers. It is important to note that the NCTCOG TIM Training Course is equivalent to the course offered by Federal Highway Administration (FHWA); however, the NCTCOG course content is specific to the North Central Texas region. NCTCOG TIM Training Course participants can also earn continuing education credit for Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE), Track Type II Fire, and Texas Department of State Health Services for EMS. For your reference, summaries of the regional attendance levels for the NCTCOG's First Responder and Manager Course and the Executive Level Course can be found on NCTCOG's Traffic Incident Management Training Program web page at www.nctcog.org/TIMTraining.

Although the NCTCOG TIM training has been very successful, it can be even more successful with the assistance and continual involvement of decision makers such as you. In order to have compliance at the first responder level, it is of vital importance that agency decision makers have an understanding of what is required of all responders during an incident; this includes police officers, fire fighters, tow truck operators, roadway construction crews, and mobility assistance crews, etc. Understanding the importance of incident management training, the Texas Commission on Fire Protection passed Rule 435.29 in July 2015, which requires

completion of a minimum four-hour FHWA Traffic Incident Management program for all certified firefighters within one year of appointment to a regulated entity. Additionally, TCOLE incorporated a four-hour TIM training component into the Basic Peace Officer Course curriculum for new cadets/recruits as of April 1, 2020.

The Executive Level Course provides you with an overview of the two-day First Responder and Manager Course. Additionally, the Executive Level Course also includes updates in accordance with the Strategic Highway Research Program (SHRP2) National Program. Those agencies that have participated in the training prior to 2013 are strongly encouraged to attend again, as major course updates have occurred since then, as well as updates to legislation, ANSI Standards, and best practices. Important to note is that agency attendance from both police and fire agencies at the TIM training will continue to be a scoring component in future NCTCOG incident management-related funding opportunities.

You are invited to attend the Traffic Incident Management Executive Level Course scheduled for Thursday, November 2, 2023, from 10 am to 12 pm. The course will be held in the Transportation Council Room at NCTCOG offices at 616 Six Flags Dr. Arlington 76011. There is no charge for this event.

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HISTORY

- In 2012, TxDOT requested assistance from the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) to replenish the State Infrastructure Bank (SIB) by "purchasing" an NTTA SIB loan.
- NTTA originally took out the loan to finance construction of the President George Bush Turnpike (PGBT)
- In October 2012, the RTC agreed to assist TxDOT and assumed the NTTA SIB loan using Regional Toll Revenue (RTR) funds
 - Collin, Dallas, and Denton County RTR funds were utilized at their request to earn higher interest rates
 - Allowed the SIB additional capacity to make loans to other projects in other parts of the state
- As part of this partnership, the RTC and TxDOT finalized a strategy reducing TxDOT staff costs for on-system RTR projects – all funds were repaid

- The RTC helped TxDOT by recapitalizing the SIB for future use on other projects across the state
- The partnership allowed TxDOT and the RTC to finalize and implement a successful strategy for how TxDOT charges on-system staff costs for RTR projects long-term
- The RTC and county RTR accounts benefitted from higher interest earned
- A plan is underway to program these funds






8-HOUR OZONE NAAQS HISTORICAL TRENDS





Meeting Date and Location

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) held a hybrid public meeting Monday, Sept. 11, 2023 at noon in Arlington. Patrons could attend in person, via phone or view the live stream at www.publicinput.com/nctcogSept23. Natalie Bettger, Senior Program Manager, moderated the meeting attended by 48 people.

Public Meeting Purpose and Topics

The public meeting was held in accordance with the NCTCOG Transportation Department Public Participation Plan, which became effective June 1, 1994, as approved by the Regional Transportation Council (RTC), the transportation policy board for the metropolitan planning organization, and amended on November 8, 2018. Staff presented information about:

- North Texas Airspace Awareness Pilot Program presented by Ernest Huffman
- Transit Strategic Partnerships Program presented by Gypsy Gavia
- FY23 Public Transportation Funding: Programs of Projects presented by Ke'Ana Jones
- Texas Electric Vehicle Registration Update presented by Savana Nance

The public meeting was held to educate, inform and seek comments from the public. Comments were solicited from those attending who wished to speak for the record. The presentations made during the meeting as well as a video recording were posted online at www.publicinput.com/nctcoqSept23.

NCTCOG staff has established a pilot program to increase awareness around regional aircraft safety. This pilot aims to improve communication between unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) platform providers, increase safety and enhance community engagement efforts.

Municipalities participating in the pilot will be able to publish public advisories and local rules and regulations related to drone traffic. The pilot is a two-year program, and each city will receive at least one free license from a provider to work on the project. In the second year of the project, participants will focus on the integration of collected data.

In addition to working with municipalities throughout the Dallas-Fort Worth region, NCTCOG staff has also created the UAS Know Before You Fly Your Drone workshop, which includes 21 free videos that aid in teaching North Texans how to safely and efficiently fly drones throughout the metroplex. The series covers a variety of topics, including types of drones as well as educational and networking opportunities.

The Transit Strategic Partnerships Program was created as a competitive funding program. Eligible applicants include transit authorities, rural providers and nonprofits collaborating with existing transit providers to avoid duplication of services. The program funds new or expanded services for two to three years and focuses on the needs of low-income populations, elderly individuals and people with disabilities.

The most recent cycle of project evaluations has concluded, and projects being recommended to receive funding include:

- Dynamic Direct Route Service (City of Arlington): \$1,126,873
- Forest Hill On-Demand Service (Trinity Metro): \$460,081
- Mobility Management (DCTA): \$110,000

NCTCOG is currently accepting the next round of Transit Strategic Partnership proposals through Nov. 30, 2023. Proposals will be reviewed and scored in December 2023, projects will be selected in January 2024 and federal approval is expected in September 2024.

Public transportation is part of a comprehensive transportation system and includes various types of services, such as fixed route, commuter, demand response and rail. Investing in these modes has a positive economic impact within communities, provides access for people with mobility impairments, reduces roadway congestion and improves air quality as well as safety.

Three urbanized areas, Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington, Denton-Lewisville, and McKinney, are eligible to receive formula funds through the Programs of Projects. There are four federal funding programs for the aforementioned areas:

- Urbanized Area Formula
- Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities
- State of Good Repair
- Bus and Bus Facilities

The Dallas-Fort Worth region received approximately \$193.4 million in Federal Transit Administration (FTA) formula funds through the Fiscal Year 2023 award cycle. NCTCOG utilizes two different processes to award these funds. Two percent of the funding is set aside for strategic partnerships. Ninety-eight percent of the funding is available annually through the Programs of Projects process.

Approximately \$156.2 million of the Programs of Projects funding for Fiscal Year 2023 was utilized by transit authorities. Of this \$156.2 million, 64 percent was utilized by Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART), 20 percent by Trinity Metro and 6 percent by the Denton County Transit Authority (DCTA). The remaining 10 percent of funding was utilized by all other transit providers.

The Dallas Fort Worth Clean Cities Coalition (DFWCC) is part of a national program that focuses on reducing emissions and energy consumption from transportation. The Coalition receives electric vehicle registration data from the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles, which includes both battery electric and plugin hybrid vehicles. This data is used by local governments, the general public, utilities and the Coalition for infrastructure planning, outreach efforts and

identifying regional needs. The Dallas-Fort Worth region has approximately 80,000 registered electric vehicles (EVs), a 63 percent increase from last year.

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) set aside \$5 billion to create a network of EV charging stations across the United States. The State of Texas has been allocated approximately \$408 million of this funding and is administering the funding through a two-phase effort. The first phase involves installing DC fast chargers every 50 miles along designated corridors. The second phase focuses on building infrastructure in rural areas and working with metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs) to determine where infrastructure is needed within urbanized areas.

Additionally, Oncor Electric Delivery, the largest transmission distribution utility in the State, has created an EVolution program to work with fleets and commercial partners to plan for electric vehicle infrastructure and charging. Signing up with Oncor allows individuals to be eligible for Oncor's EV Charging Study, which provides multiple incentives to offset demand from EV charging stations.

Lastly, each year National Drive Electric Week (NDEW) is held to raise awareness about EVs and provides chances for direct conversation with EV owners as well as test driving opportunities. This year, NDEW activities will take place from Sunday, Oct. 1, at the Tanger Outlets in Fort Worth. For more information and to register for NDEW 2023 activities, visit www.dfwcleancities.org/ndew.







The project was jointly funded by the City of Dallas, Dallas County and the Regional Transportation Council at NCTCOG. Because the bridge was designed to be supported by cables from above, it did not require support columns in the middle of the highway. While that made construction and installation more challenging, the contractor came up with a plan to piece together the network tied arch bridge behind a nearby shopping center building and then move it into place. The bridge, which was designed with two curves, is said to be the first doubly-curved network tied arch bridge in the world. The end result is a bridge that will serve as a reminder of the hard work of TxDOT and its partners.

The final bridge and trail connections are expected to open in fall 2023.



Moving Day For The Northaven Trail Bridge

N orth Texas' newest pedestrian bridge has moved into its permanent

Yes, moved - as in putting a 201-foot-



long, 50-foot-tall arch on industrial strength trailers and moving it several hundred feet. Then, lifting the 800,000-pound behemoth from both

ends with special hydraulic jacks and gantries, which then ease the span onto its new home over US 75/North Central Expressway in Dallas.

Oh, and do it all in about 20 hours.

Simple, right? Not so much.

TxDOT Dallas crews and contractor Ragle, Inc. made the seemingly impossible happen one recent Saturday night/Sunday morning when they moved the new Northaven Trail Bridge onto columns beside the main lanes of North Central Expressway near Royal Lane.

The end result is a gleaming addition to the North Dallas skyline that will forever grace the commutes for tens of thousands of motorists. The Northaven Trail Bridge will also directly serve a growing contingent of bicyclists, pedestrians and others

who have longed for a new, safer connection from the Northaven Trail in North Dallas to the Cottonwood and White Rock Creek trails in Northeast Dallas.

"This was a unique project in many ways,"TxDOT Dallas County Area Engineer and project manager Nathan Petter said. "It took a lot of ingenuity from TxDOT, Ragle and the designer,

HNTB, to make this move effort a reality. The vision started with our regional partners at the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG), as well as leaders at the City of Dallas and Dallas County. I'm proud to have played a role in making this a reality."
