Environmental Compliance Overview

- Five Compliance Sections
 - Drinking Water Quality
 - Industrial Pretreatment (Wastewater)
 - Fats, Oils, and Grease (FOG)
 - Stormwater
 - Cross Connection Program (Backflow)
- Primary enforcement mechanism is Chapter 41



Ordinance Changes Timeline



- Started process in December 2019
 - Multiple meetings with Legal and Administration staff
 - Justification for changes
 - Buy-in
 - COVID-19
 - Delayed presentation to Council
 - Final Adoption December 2020

Chapter 41 Ordinance Changes Overview



- Last major update 2003
 - Minor change to Fats, Oils, and Grease Section - 2014
- Water Utilities adopted new technology that modified operations
- Comply with Federal and State Regulation changes

Fats, Oils and Grease Program

- Revisions regarding the Liquid Waste Hauler program:
 - Electronic submittal of Liquid
 Waste Trip Tickets
 - Calendar Year Permit Terms
 - Administrative updates



Fats, Oils and Grease Program



- New requirements for businesses operating with grease or grit traps:
 - Adopt the 25% rule for trap inspections
 - Require plan review of all proposed grease trap installations
 - Revamp minimum sizing requirements
 - Mandate property owners empty grease traps when facility is vacated

Cross Connection Program

- Changes to Article V, Cross
 Connection:
 - Reflect administrative revisions
 - Incorporate TCEQ BPAT Licensing into Tester Requirements
 - Clarified backflow testing services of Water Utilities personnel



Stormwater Regulations



- Change to Article X, Municipal
 Stormwater Drainage Regulations
 and Acts Adversely Affecting
 Water Quality:
 - Align time requirements for clean-up and repair of private sanitary sewer overflows (SSOs)
 - Replace "Public Works Director" with "Assistant City Manager or designee"

Final Takeaways

Will start the process all over again this year

- TRA Permit modification; adopting streamlining rules
- Will only affect a small portion of ordinance
- Lessons learned from latest adoption
- Patience...
 - A lot of it.

Implementation




- Started conversion in April 2020
 - Upgrades to current system
 - POM Portal Module of LinkoCTS
 - Cloud based solution
- COVID-19 delayed progress
 - Delay of Ordinance Changes affected progress

Training


 Conducted remote training session with Waste Haulers in December, 2020

- January 1: "went live" with trip ticket submittal
 - Most haulers opted to submit electronically before January 1 because of ease of use
- February 1: No more paper manifests
 - This allowed waste haulers with extra trip tickets to use and submit



Full Implementation

are commended to the commendation of the comme



- Currently all trip tickets are entered electronically except for new businesses
- POM Portal allows staff to target problem grease interceptors
 - Waste haulers are now allowed to submit photos and comments of grease interceptors in need of repair
- Upgrade also included Remote Inspector Module

Conclusion

- If considering an electronic solution
 - Start data verification now!
 - Waste haulers are reliant on the data in your database

- Still field
- Consider "paperless" options
 - Waste haulers are still required to manifest waste
