

Counties






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


Monitoring Sites – TCEQ/Atkins

86th Texas Legislative Update

HB 1506 / SB 1694

- Relating to authorizing a regulatory authority to establish reduced water and sewer utility rates funded by donations for the benefit of certain low-income customers
- Seeks to provide a means for reduced water and sewer rates for certain classes of customers
- Bill passed House on April 9, 2019
- Senate referred to Water & Rural Affairs on 4/15/19
- Placed on intent calendar 5/22/19

SB 81

- Relating to the naming of a reservoir by certain water districts
- The district must request approval of the name from the commissioner's court of the county in which the reservoir project site is located
- Bill passed Senate Committee on Water & Rural Affairs unanimously on April 11, 2019
- House Referred to Natural Resources on April 16, 2019
- House left pending in committee on April 30, 2019

SB 530 / HB 1267

- Relating to civil and administrative penalties assessed or imposed for violations of laws protecting drinking water, public water supplies, and bodies of water
- Seeks to provide additional flexibility to allow TCEQ to penalize public water suppliers who simply pay the monetary penalties ordered by TCEQ and do not undertake the necessary corrective actions
- Signed by Governor Effective on 9/1/19

SB 700 / HB 1587

- Relating to retail public utilities that provide water or sewer service
- Makes changes to the procedures for water ratemaking cases to improve and streamline the ratemaking process for utilities and consumers
- Signed by Governor Effective 9/1/19

SB 912

- Relating to the suspension of operations of water districts that have failed to follow a court order or administrative directive by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.
- Senate Referred to Water & Rural Affairs on March 1, 2019



- Relating to the duty of a water supply system to provide certain information to consumers regarding fluoride in drinking water
- Senate Referred to Water & Rural Affairs on March 7, 2019

SB 1379 / HB 2957

- Relating to a requirement that certain recipients of financial assistance from the TWDB adopt certain restrictions on water use by their customers
- Senate Referred to Water & Rural Affairs on March 14, 2019
- House Referred to Natural Resources on March 12, 2019

- HB 5 Related to debris management and other disaster recovery efforts
- HB 6 Related to developing a disaster recovery task force to assist with long-term disaster recovery
- Both signed by Governor Effective 9/1/19

Bills Passed on Water Disasters

- HB 7 Relating to disaster preparation and requires Texas Division of Emergency Mgmt to assist political subdivisions with executing contracts needed following a disaster
- HB 26 Requires the owner/operator of stateregulated dams with spillways used to regulate flood waters to notify downstream communities when releases are made
- Both signed by Governor Effective 9/1/19

Legislation that Made it to the Governor

► HB 191

- Relating to the disposal of pesticides
- Requires the TX Dept. of Agriculture (TDA) and TCEQ to organize pesticide waste and container collection activities statewide
- Creates the pesticide disposal fund to be administered by TDA to fund those activities
- Signed by Governor Effective 9/1/19



- Relating to appropriations of water for recharge of aquifers and use in aquifer storage and recovery (ASR) projects.
- Allows unappropriated water, including stormwater and flood water, to be appropriated for recharge into an aquifer
- Water appropriated for diversion and a beneficial use can be stored in an aquifer storage and recovery project before the water is recovered for that use
- Signed by Governor Effective immediately



- Requires the TWDB to conduct statewide studies and surveys and submit reports on aquifer storage and recovery
- Signed by Governor Effective immediately

- Relating to the development of brackish groundwater
- Sets up rules governing the issuance of permits for completing and operating a brackish groundwater well
- Signed by Governor Effective 9/1/19





Requires TCEP to obtain or develop updated Water Availability Models (WAMs) for the Brazos, Neches, Red, and Rio Grande River Basins

Signed by Governor - Effective 9/1/19



- Creates an interregional planning council made up of representatives from the state's regional water planning groups
- Expands the requirements for information that planning groups would be required to provide in their regional water plans, such as an assessment on the potential for aquifer storage and recovery to meet needs
- Signed by Governor Effective immediately



- Authorizes the TWDB to use the state participation account of the water development fund to provide financial assistance for the development of projects related to certain reservoirs, facilities and water treatment works
- Signed by Governor Effective 9/1/19



- Relating to a biennial report on stormwater infrastructure in this state
- Passed in House and Senate; Vetoed by Governor
- Link to Bill



- Amends Water Code to exempt certain applications for amendments to a water right that otherwise met the requirements of the Water Code to any requirements regarding notice and hearing or technical review.
- Seeks to streamline the water rights permitting process for minor water rights amendments.
- Signed by Governor Effective immediately



- TCEQ is to establish a system to provide automatic reminders to public drinking water supply systems about regular, applicable reporting requirements.
- This reminder is a courtesy as the public drinking water supply system is responsible for complying with reporting regardless of reminders.

Signed by Governor - Effective 9/1/19

HB 3339/SB 2331

- Relating to requirements for programs of water conservation and water conservation plans.
- Sets water conservation plan requirements for an application for financial assistance under specified water related programs and funds
- Filed without Governor's signature Effective 9/1/19

HB 3542/SB 1725

- Relating to valuation of a retail public utility or its facilities as part of a voluntary acquisition
- Establishes a process by which a Class A public utility providing retail water or sewer service could acquire a retail public utility, or the facilities of a utility, as the result of a voluntary arms-length transaction
- Passed in House and Senate; Filed without Governor's signature- Effective 9/1/19



- Prohibits the owner or operator of a public water supply system from permanently terminating the fluoridation of the water unless written notice was provided to the customers and the TCEQ.
- Signed by Governor Effective 9/1/19

HB 4638/SB 2550

- Relating to the creation of the Bear Creek Ranch Municipal Utility District No. 1 of Parker County; granting a limited power of eminent domain; providing authority to issue bonds; providing authority to impose assessments, fees, and taxes.
- Signed by Governor Effective 9/1/19

HB 4672/SB 2546- EB

- Relating to the powers and duties of the Collin County Municipal Utility District No. 2; providing authority to issue bonds and impose fees and taxes.
- Signed by Governor Effective immediately

- Relating to meetings for special purpose districts.
- Requires open meetings of certain special districts with populations over 500 to be held within 10 miles of the district if there is no suitable location in the district.
- Requires meetings to be recorded at a reasonable quality and archived on the internet.
- Signed by Governor Effective 9/1/19

SB 911

- Relating to the supervision of water districts by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.
- Sets deadlines for reviewing a district's audit report, and sets deadlines for filing a copy of an order relating to the results of a confirmation election for certain water districts.

Signed by the Governor – Effective 9/1/19

Amends the conditions under which the TWDB may use the state water pollution control revolving fund to make a loan.

Sets deadline of December 1, 2032 for TWDB to identify and designate brackish groundwater production zones
