



#### 2017-2018 CMAQ/STBG: Transit Program









## Potential Arlington Station and Alignment Options








## 2016 Crash Rates By County








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## 2016 MAPP Assists By Roadway – Dallas County Operations




# Wrong-Way Driving Pilot Projects -Dallas and Tarrant Counties

### Phase I — Dallas County

- > Began with 350 Diamond Interchanges
  - Replacement of conflicting lane and arrow markings, signal enhancements
  - 156 Intersections completed
- > Expanded into Collin and Denton Counties
  - Identified 32 additional intersections
- Phase II Tarrant County
  - Focused on 54.2 miles of seven freeway corridors
    - Pavement markings, enhanced signage with activedetection units, optimized sign placement, and use of technology





Based on ≤70 ppb (As of June 22, 2017)




