#### **PUBLIC COMMENT ON AGENDA ITEMS**

President Sweet opened the meeting for public comment and asked if there was anyone present wishing to speak. There being no one, he proceeded with the meeting.

#### ACTION:

#### Item 1 Approval of Minutes

President Sweet stated that the first item on the agenda was approval of the minutes from the November Board meeting.

Upon a Motion by Judge Whitley (seconded by Councilmember Mendelsohn), and unanimous vote of all members present, the Board approved the minutes of the November 18, 2021, Executive Board meeting.

#### Item 2 Resolution to Accept and Approve the Quarterly Investment Report

Molly Rendon, Director of Administration, asked the Board to approve the Quarterly Investment Report for the quarter that ended December 31, 2021, as required by the Investment Policy and the Public Funds Investment Act. The report shows the average rate of return, cumulative transactions and beginning and ending balances for the quarter. She also included the supplementary schedule of the State investment activity for the Regional Toll Revenue funds and the NTTA Hwy 161 funds.

Upon a Motion by Mayor Carmona (seconded by Mayor Hairston), and unanimous vote of all members present, the Board approved the resolution as presented.

## Item 3 Resolution Authorizing Contracts for Early Childhood Education Equipment and Materials for Child Care Providers

Phedra Redifer, Director of Workforce Development, requested Board approval to enter contract agreements with Kaplan Early Learning Company, Lakeshore Learning Materials, Community Playthings, and Discount School Supply for Early Childhood Education equipment and materials, for maximum two (2) year terms and in a cumulative amount not to exceed \$2,000,000. She explained that the materials selected will be used to help enhance indoor and outdoor learning environments within the programs to meet specific Texas Rising Star assessment measures for improvement. In addition, the purchases will also be used to incentivize Early Learning Programs for entrance into the Texas Rising Star program or recertification through a full Texas Rising Star assessment. The vendors selected were solicited and documented under the BuyBoard Proposal Name: Instructional Materials and Classroom Teaching Supplies and Equipment; Proposal Number 653-21 and/or Proposal Name: Furniture for School Office, Science, Library and Dormitory; Proposal Number 584-19.

## Item 4 Resolution Authorizing Agreement with the City of Dallas for the Clean Fleets North Texas 2020 Call for Projects

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board approval to enter an agreement with the City of Dallas for the Clean Fleets North Texas 2020 Call for Project in an amount not to exceed \$109,116 in EPA funds (no more than 35 percent of project costs) and a local contribution by the City of Dallas of approximately \$255,640 (at least 65 percent of the project cost). The Clean Fleets North Texas 2020 Call for Projects (CFP) is funded by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) National Clean Diesel Funding Assistance Program and is authorized by the Regional Transportation Council (RTC). The program provides funding for heavy-duty diesel vehicle or equipment replacement activities.

## Item 5 Resolution Authorizing a Contract with Cambridge Systematics, Inc. to Conduct a Transit Planning Study in Denton County

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board authorization to enter a contract with Cambridge Systematics, Inc., to conduct a Transit Planning Study in Denton County in an amount not to exceed \$435,000 (\$435,000 FTA and 87,000 in TDCs in lieu of local match). The project will provide planning expertise to develop a comprehensive approach to planning and implementing transit services outside of transit authority service areas in Denton County. The project is funded through Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds and utilizes Transportation Development Credits (TDCs) in lieu of local match. Cambridge Systematics, Inc., has committed to meet a minimum Disadvantaged Business Enterprise participation goal of 31.3 percent for this project.

## Item 6 Resolution Authorizing a Contract with Nelson\Nygaard Consulting Associates, Inc. to Conduct an Intermodal Transportation Hub Study for Colleges and Universities in the North Central Texas Region

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board approval to enter a contract with Nelson\Nygaard Consulting Associates, Inc. to conduct an Intermodal Transportation Hub Study for Colleges and Universities in the

North Central Texas region in an amount not to exceed \$350,000 (\$350,000 STBG funds and 70,000 in TDCs in lieu of local match). The project will provide expertise in developing a comprehensive guide for planning and strategic implementation of mobility hubs on college and university campuses around the region. This project is funded through Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) funds and utilizes Transportation Development Credits (TDCs) in lieu of local match. Nelson\Nygaard Consulting Associates, Inc., has committed to meet a minimum Disadvantaged Business Enterprise participation goal of 31.3 percent for this project.

## Item 7 Resolution Authorizing Agreements for the Blue-Green-Grey Application for New Ideas

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board authorization to enter agreements with the following for the Blue-Green-Grey application for new ideas in an amount not to exceed \$201,410:

- Huitt-Zollars, Inc./City of Allen Inlet Floatables Filters (in an amount not to exceed \$75,000)
- The Golden SEEDS Foundation, Design Jones, University of Texas at Arlington, and City of Dallas –
   Bottom District Neighborhood Beautification (in an amount not to exceed \$74,910)
- University of Texas at Arlington/City of Fort Worth Laboratory Testing of Engineered Media for Biofiltration Swales (in an amount not to exceed \$51,500)

Eligible projects for the Blue-Green-Grey application for new ideas were to be in the 12-county Metropolitan Planning Area and address innovative outcomes focused on three elements – Blue (water), Green (environment), and Grey (transportation infrastructure) in which applicants consisting of teams of individuals, private firms, and governmental agencies could receive a maximum award of \$75,000. The Regional Transportation Council (RTC) Local funds will be used to fund these awards. No local match is required.

## Item 8 Resolution Approving Modifications to the <u>FY2022 and FY2023 Unified Planning</u> Work Program for Regional Transportation Planning

Dan Kessler, Assistant Director of Transportation, requested Board approval for modifications to the <u>FY2022 and FY2023 Unified Planning Work Program for Regional Transportation Planning</u> (UPWP), including new initiatives, updates to existing projects and funding adjustments. He explained the proposed modifications, which have been approved by the Regional Transportation Council. The UPWP is required by federal and State transportation planning regulations and provides a summary of the transportation and related air quality planning tasks to be conducted by Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) staff.

She further explained that NCTCOG currently has agreements with two competitively procured entities to provide instruction and training services that will expire on January 31, 2022. NCTCOG released a Call for Projects in October 2021. Following evaluation from the proposal review subcommittee, these entities were awarded.

Following evaluation, the proposal review subcommittee recommended the above entities.

#### Item 11 Resolution Adopting FY 2023 Criminal Justice Program Policies and Procedures

Kelly Schmidt, Criminal Justice Program Administrator, asked the Board to approve the FY 2023 Policies and Procedures recommended by the Criminal Justice Policy Development Committee (CJPDC). She explained that the Statement of Work within the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement with the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Public Safety Office (PSO) specifies that NCTCOG is responsible for reviewing and scoring criminal justice grant applications from local agencies. In this capacity, NCTCOG is required to adopt Policies and Procedures that guide the application process and define committee responsibilities. The most significant change follows a PSO recommendation to add language regarding removal of a CJPDC member (§§ 7.1.6. and 7.1.7.). Other revisions include updates to grant period timeframes, minor sentence restructuring for clarity, and date revisions.



## **MODELING OVERVIEW**

## **COMPREHENSIVE INPUT**



Leverage the availability of a long time series of satellite imagery to understand changes in the built environment

Acquire observed and projected measures of residential and commercial activity in the form of household, population, and employment counts to serve as controls

Bring the understanding of the changes in the built environment and measures of activity together and quantify the relationships using mathematical models

Use these models to determine how much area must be transformed (built) to satisfy the projected activity levels (controls)

Develop statistical models that indicate the probability of a particular area becoming developed considering the permitted use, proximity to important activity nodes, and other features

Use these probabilities, expressed as continuous surfaces, to predict the type and timing of development

Adjust the surfaces (up or down) to match the controls and assign activity growth levels to individual areas while accumulating changes through feedback loops









Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Agreements for the Receipt of Funds for Planning and

Implementation Programs from the Texas Department of Transportation

The Executive Board has previously approved receipt of funding for continuation and enhancement of ongoing transportation and air quality initiatives and for new projects implemented and managed by the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) staff. This item reaffirms previous Executive Board approvals and includes the newest Regional Transportation Council (RTC)-requested projects. The resolution approving receipt of revenue and execution of necessary agreements is included in the agreements with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

The Regional Transportation Council approved the programming of funds for these projects at various times, including three additional FY2022 agreements. Also, the Executive Board previously authorized the receipt of funds for the GoCarma Demonstration on US 75 Technology Lanes or Other Corridors for which the source of funds and funding shares were recently modified. This information is included in the attached table. The RTC approval date is included in this information. In preparation for development and execution of FY2022 agreements, staff is requesting Executive Board approval to receive funding. This includes Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) funds, Category 10 funds, Regional Toll Revenue (RTR) funds, local match contributed by award partner, and RTC Transportation Development Credits. This totals to approximately \$16,450,000 (\$6,450,000 STBG + \$5,000,000 Category 10 + \$925,000 RTR local match + \$4,075,000 local match + 1,290,000 in Transportation Development Credits in lieu of match). Attachment 1 contains a table detailing individual funding agreements. NCTCOG will coordinate with TxDOT to enter into agreements to receive these funds.

A draft resolution authorizing the receipt of funds for planning and implementation programs is attached for Executive Board consideration. I will provide a brief presentation of this item and will be available to answer any questions.

Item Title: Resolution Authorizing an Amendment to the Contract with CARMA, Inc. and

an Agreement with the Texas Transportation Institute for Auto Occupancy

Verification Technology Demonstration Project

In December 2016, the Executive Board authorized the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) to contract with CARMA, Inc. to implement an auto occupancy detection and verification technology for tolled managed lanes in the Dallas-Fort Worth (DFW) region. The Executive Board authorized a contract with CARMA for a pilot project not to exceed \$2 million with an option to extend the agreement up to a 10-year period for a total not to exceed \$18 million contingent on 1) successful completion of the pilot and 2) sufficient funding allocated by the Regional Transportation Council (RTC). In January 2019, the pilot project moved to the integration phase, and the Executive Board authorized an amendment of the contract with CARMA by increasing the pilot project not-to-exceed amount to \$3,300,000 with a total contract authorization amount not to exceed \$19,300,000.

NCTCOG, in partnership with the Texas Department of Transportation, CARMA and Texas Transportation Institute, recently received \$10 million in additional funding to continue the development and evaluation of this technology as part of the Surface Transportation System Funding Alternatives Program (Category 10 funds). The Executive Board approval for the receipt of these funds was included in the previous item. In order to implement this program, the Executive Board will be requested to authorize an amendment of the contract with CARMA by increasing the contract amount by \$2,735,000 (\$2,735,000 Surface Transportation System Funding Alternatives) for an amount not to exceed \$22,035,000 to implement a demonstration project to develop an accounting framework to provide high-occupant vehicles financial discounts or rewards along corridors in the DFW region. CARMA is responsible to provide in-kind match of \$4,075,000.

In addition, the Executive Board will be requested to authorize NCTCOG to enter into an agreement with the Texas Transportation Institute to evaluate the effectiveness of the CARMA technology accounting framework for the demonstration for an amount not to exceed \$810,000 (\$810,000 Surface Transportation System Funding Alternatives).

A draft resolution authorizing an amendment to the contract with CARMA, Inc. and an agreement with the Texas Transportation Institute to implement an auto occupancy detection and verification technology demonstration project is attached for Executive Board consideration. **WHEREAS,** on April 8, 2016, NCTCOG initiated a Request for Proposals to secure the vendor for Auto Occupancy Detection and Verification Technology; and,

WHEREAS, in December 2016, the NCTCOG Executive Board adopted a resolution authorizing NCTCOG to contract with CARMA, Inc. and in January 2019, the NCTCOG Executive Board adopted a resolution authorizing NCTCOG to increase the contract not-to-exceed amount with CARMA, Inc. to Implement Technology to Automatically Detect and Verify Vehicle Occupancy for Users of Tolled Managed Lane Facilities in the Dallas-Fort Worth region for NCTCOG:

Item Title: Resolution Amending Authorization to Include Tarrant Regional Water District

as a Necessary Party to the Interlocal Agreement with the City of Fort Worth

Concerning the Trinity River Vision Bridges Project

In March 2020, the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) approved an increase of \$20,000,000 for the Trinity River Vision (TRV) Bridges Project. The TRV Bridges Project includes the construction of three bridges over a new bypass section of the Trinity River in downtown Fort Worth. The Bypass Channel is now funded by the United States Army Corps of Engineers. The bridges were originally funded in 2011 with a total of \$69.9 million in federal, State, City and private partner funding. Due to constructability issues and resulting delays, the projected costs increased. To fund the cost increase, the RTC allocated \$20,000,000 to the City of Fort Worth, of which \$15,000,000 is a grant and \$5,000,000 to be repaid to the North Central Texas Council of Governments as the RTC's fiscal agent.

On August 27, 2020, the Executive Board authorized an Interlocal Agreement (ILA) with the City of Fort Worth for the repayment of \$5,000,000, consistent with the terms and conditions outlined in the RTC action. Through efforts to finalize the ILA, the City of Fort Worth has identified that a portion of the payments will be made by the Tarrant Regional Water District.

A draft resolution amending authorization to include the Tarrant Regional Water District as a necessary party to the Interlocal Agreement with the City of Fort Worth for the repayment of \$5,000,000 associated with the Trinity River Vision Bridges Project is attached for Executive Board consideration. I will provide a brief presentation on this item and will be available to answer any questions prior to requesting Board approval.

In 2012, the Executive Board authorized an agreement with SLF III – The Canyon TIF, L.P., (Stratford Land) to receive \$3,000,000 over a ten-year period through a combination of Tax Increment Financing (TIF) revenues and developer funds related to the construction of IH 30 frontage roads west of Westmoreland in the City of Dallas. The developer is transferring its holdings and has requested NCTCOG consent to the assignment of its obligations to LMC Canyon Holdings, LLC, which has indicated its commitment to fully comply with the terms of the original agreement and make the remaining payments on schedule.

Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Purchase and Placement of Education Campaigns for

Transportation Initiatives: Phase 1 – Notifications for Public Input/Meetings

Since January 2014, the Executive Board has approved education campaign funding annually for various transportation programs. Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 Education Campaigns for Transportation Initiatives: Phase 1 - Notifications for Public Input/Meetings was included in the FY2022 and FY2023 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), which was approved by the Regional Transportation Council (RTC) and Executive Board.

Combining education campaign efforts within the Transportation Department has resulted in increased website traffic, greater public participation, and lower costs. Additional benefits received include efficiencies with media outlets such as improved staff coordination; increased timeliness; a broader audience reach, including historically underserved populations; and cross-program communication. FY2022 education campaigns will be taken in phases so that we can be strategic in how North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) staff plans and implements messages, and NCTCOG staff will come back to the Executive Board at a future meeting with another phase. In Phase 1, education campaigns may be presented through print publications and digital placements, social media, radio and TV, and transportation displays in multiple languages when appropriate.

The Notifications for Public Input/Meetings aims to provide reasonable opportunities for the public to learn about and comment on the region's transportation plans according to requirements of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. Public meetings and other opportunities allow North Texans to learn about and provide input on transportation and air quality in the region and help set priorities for the future. This effort will be funded with \$85,000 of Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds, Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG) funds, Transportation Planning Funds (TPF), and RTC Transportation Development Credits (TDCs) in lieu of cash match.

Staff is seeking Executive Board approval to spend up to \$85,000 for the purchase and placement of department education campaigns that will initiate in FY2022 during our Phase 1 approach. A draft resolution authorizing the purchase and placement of Transportation Department educational campaigns is attached for Executive Board consideration. A funding table detailing funding sources and funding amounts, including match sources and match amounts, is provided in Attachment 1 to this memorandum. I will provide a brief presentation on this item and be available to answer any questions prior to requesting Board approval.

Item Title: Resolution Accepting the Report from Whitley Penn, LLP, for the

Transportation Department's Agreed Upon Procedures

In April and May 2021, the accounting firm of Whitley Penn, LLP, conducted a review of Transportation Department consultant and subgrantee contracts in excess of \$250,000 that closed during Fiscal Year 2020. This review is a requirement of the Transportation Department's Contractor Procurement Procedures, which serve as the Metropolitan Planning Organization's procurement policies. These policies have been approved by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) to support compliance with regulations guiding the use of federal funds.

The review consisted of a financial and non-financial assessment of Transportation Department consultant and subgrantee contracts to verify adherence with invoice and contract compliance procedures. A total of nine contracts were selected through a random sample of 17 contracts that were closed during Fiscal Year 2020. Four contracts selected were funded through Agreements with TxDOT and five contracts were funded through the Federal Transit Administration.

NCTCOG staff developed the list of seven procedural areas that the auditors were asked to test. Specifically, auditors reviewed the following:

- A. Evidence of verification and calculation of allowable profit;
- B. Evidence of Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) participation;
- C. Proper verification of review of final work product to authorize final payment;
- D. Proper documentation and review of expenditures compared to agreed upon budgets;
- E. Evidence of verification and calculation of overhead rates:
- F. Proper determination of allowable costs; and
- G. Verification of timely payment.

The auditor's report is included in the attached resolution. The report indicates there were no exceptions in six of the procedural areas. The seventh procedural area of review, verification of timely payment, identified one voucher that was not paid timely. This one payment was identified from 42 randomly selected vouchers reviewed by the auditors. Review of payment timeliness was first included as part of the external agreed upon procedures review conducted in June 2020. Following the first assessment of this criteria, which identified four vouchers that were not paid timely, staff examined and updated payment review procedures to support compliance with prompt payment requirements.

The satisfactory results and assurances of the appropriate management oversight have been applied to the payment review process; therefore, staff submits the attached draft resolution accepting the report for Executive Board consideration. NCTCOG staff will also be available to answer any questions prior to requesting Board approval.
