


Rail Station Fact Sheet – CentrePort/DFW Airport Station




Station Overview

CentrePort/DFW Airport Station is located by Statler Boulevard at Breezewood Drive in Fort Worth. Free shuttles connect the station to DFW International Airport via the Remote South buses. The station opened in 2000 and is served by the Trinity Railway Express (TRE) commuter rail.

Regional Rail Transit Lines














Land Use Percentages








Zoning (2016) – CentrePort/DFW Airport Station








Pedestrian Routes to Rail - Centreport/DFW Station




Existing sidewalk facilities greater than a 0.5 mile walk distance

Existing sidewalk facilites that are disconnected due to a gap in the network


Project Overview

The Pedestrian Routes to Rail study identifies all existing pedestrian facilities within a half-mile radius of existing light rail and commuter rail stations in the Dallas-Fort Worth region based on 2014 data. ArcGIS Network Analyst tool was used to identify continuous facilities that are less than or greater than a half-mile actual walking distance to a station. The maps also reflect existing facilities that are disconnected due to gaps or other barriers not allowing a continuous pedestrian route to a station. The maps do not reflect the condition or ADA compliance of the existing infrastructure. More information on the Routes to Rail study and methodology is available at:

Project Overview

The Bicycle Routes to Rail study identifies all existing and planned bikeways in proximity to existing or under-construction light rail and commuter rail stations in the Dallas / Fort Worth region based on 2016 data. The maps reflect off-street paths (trails) and streets designated by local adopted master plans for dedicated bikeways (e.g. bike lanes, cycle tracks) located on the street. In accordance with the Texas Transportation Code, bicyclists have a right to the road. As such, the map does not reflect other roadways around the station that may have signed bike routes or by state law may be used by bicyclists.
