PUBLIC COMMENT ON AGENDA ITEMS

Vice President Johnson opened the meeting for public comment and asked if there was anyone present wishing to speak. There being no one, she proceeded with the meeting.

CONSENT AGENDA ITEMS:

Items 1 - 14 were posted on the agenda as Consent Items.

Item 1 Approval of Minutes

Item 2 Resolution Authorizing a Contract Extension with Wise County Committee on Aging for Title III Federal Services

Board authorization was requested to extend the current contract with Wise County Committee on Aging for Title III nutrition and transportation services until December 31, 2024. The existing contract expires on September 30, 2024, and the extension will enable staff to issue a new Call for Projects, evaluate the proposals, and obtain Board approval to enter into agreement(s) with the successful applicant(s).

Item 3 Resolution Authorizing Contracts for Road and Highway Asset Management

Board authorization was requested to enter contractual agreements with Blyncsy, Inc., GoodRoads, Inc., and Vialytics Americas, Inc. to provide Road and Highway Asset Management Software Services for maximum five (5) year terms through the North Central Texas Council of Governments' TXShare cooperative purchasing program. The contracts will retain the services of firms that leverage machine-learning in a secure communications environment. A Request for Proposals was issued and received four (4) submissions. Following evaluation by a committee comprised of NCTCOG staff and the City of Fort Worth, contracts with the selected firms are recommended award.

Item 4 Resolution Endorsing the FY25 Contract Renewal Amendment with the State Energy Conservation Office

Board endorsement was requested for a one-year, \$250,000 contract renewal amendment with the State Energy Conservation Office for Fiscal Year 2025. The contract will be funded through a \$50,000 (20%) local match of in-kind and cash match contributions and will be jointly executed by the Environment and Development Department and the Transportation Department.

Item 5 Resolution Authorizing a Contract with Highland Economics LLC for the Transportation and Stormwater Infrastructure Project

Board authorization was requested to contract with Highland Economics LLC, in an amount not to exceed \$132,000, in environmental economics consulting services to support the expansion of the integrated Transportation and Stormwater Infrastructure (TSI) project in the upper Trinity River Basin. This joint effort between NCTCOG's Environment and Development and Transportation departments is funded by the Texas General Land Office at a project cost of \$3,973,930. The work will assess the cost-benefit of using nature-based solutions integrated into the transportation infrastructure to mitigate future flood risk.

Item 6 Resolution Endorsing Grant Application Submittal to the U.S. Department of Agriculture for the Composting Food Waste Reduction Grant Opportunity

Board endorsement was requested for a grant application submittal to the U.S. Department of Agriculture for the Composting Food Waste Reduction Grant Opportunity between NCTCOG and the City of Dallas for approximately \$300,000 in funding. These funds will be incorporated into the appropriate fiscal year(s) budget. Required local match funds in the amount of \$75,000 will be provided by the regional participants. This project aims to collect commercial food waste, process and compost it, then redistribute the compost to local urban agricultural producers and community gardens. This opportunity also supports a commitment made to host the 9-game 2026 FIFA World Cup Series with broadcasting and ancillary team support. As part of this commitment, the region has been challenged by FIFA to implement environmentally sustainable actions that drive lasting, systemic change to support the games.

Item 7 Resolution Authorizing FY2025 Purchase of Computer Hardware, Software, and Information Technology Contract Services for the Agency

Board authorization was requested to approve the purchase of computer hardware, software, and related services in the FY2025 Information Technology Infrastructure and Services Purchase Plan in the amount of \$3,473,000.

Item 8 Resolution Endorsing Submittal of Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Railroad Crossing Elimination Program Application to the Federal Railroad Administration

Board endorsement was requested for submittal of the FY 2023-2024 Railroad Crossing Elimination Program application to the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) in the amount of \$20,000,000, as detailed in Attachment 1. In collaboration with the FRA and partner agencies, staff will identify the most efficient approaches to allocate the available funds to the region. The intention is for TxDOT to serve as the implementing agent for the Ennis Avenue/UPRR Grade Separation project.

Item 9 Resolution Authorizing a Contract with AVI-SPL for the Purchase, Maintenance, and Monitoring of Audio/Video Equipment in the Transportation Council Room

Board authorization was requested to enter a contractual agreement with AVI-SPL for the purchase of audio/visual equipment, including ongoing support for a three-year period in an amount not to exceed \$260,000. The source of funds is RTC Local with no local match required. The equipment will replace older equipment in the Transportation Council Room utilizing video streaming services for various meetings.

Item 10 Resolution Authorizing Purchase and Placement of Education Campaigns for <u>Transportation Initiatives in Fiscal Year 2025</u>

Board authorization was requested to enter into agreements with various multimedia outlets for the purchase and placement of education campaigns initiated in Fiscal Year 2025 for Transportation Department Initiatives in an amount up to \$1,779,750, as reflected in Attachment 1.

Item 11 Resolution Approving an Agreement with the City of Fort Worth to Implement Broadband Technology Along the East Rosedale Avenue and East Lancaster Avenue Corridors

Item 11 was pulled from the Consent Agenda by Councilmember Mendelsohn for Individual Consideration.

Item 12 Resolution Authorizing Use of Regional Transportation Council Local Funds for North Texas Advanced Air Mobility and Uncrewed Aviation Systems

Board authorization was requested for use of \$1,700,000 in Regional Transportation Council (RTC) Local funds to support ongoing efforts in Advanced Air Mobility (AAM) and Uncrewed Aviation Systems within North Texas. The funds were approved by the RTC at its September 12, 2024, meeting. This funding will enable continued collaboration with regional airports, local jurisdictions, and other partners to further the deployment of AAM operations in the North Texas area.

Item 13 Appointments to Department of Environment and Development Advisory Committees Board approval was requested to appoint advisory Councils and Committees to the Public Works Council Regional Codes Coordinating Committees Resources Conservation Council on

Works Council, Regional Codes Coordinating Committee, Resource Conservation Council, and the Water Resources Council.

Item 14 <u>Status Update on NCTCOG Regional SolSmart Designation</u>

Item 14 was pulled from the Consent Agenda by Vice President Johnson for Individual Consideration.

Upon a Motion by Judge Little (seconded by Mayor Heidemann), the Board unanimously approved the Consent Agenda Items 1 – 10 and 12 – 13 as posted. Exception items: Item 11 was pulled by Councilmember Mendelsohn and Item 14 was pulled by Vice President Johnson for Individual Consideration.

ITEMS FOR INDIVIDUAL CONSIDERATION:

Item 11 Resolution Approving an Agreement with the City of Fort Worth to Implement Broadband Technology Along the East Rosedale Avenue and East Lancaster Avenue Corridors

Item 11 was pulled from the Consent Agenda by Councilmember Mendelsohn for Individual Consideration.

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested Board approval to enter a contractual agreement with the City of Fort Worth. The agreement would implement broadband technology along the East Rosedale Avenue and East Lancaster Avenue corridors, at a cost not to exceed \$3,000,000 in Surface Transportation Block Grant Program funds. This funding would be matched with \$600,000 in Regional Transportation Council Transportation Development Credits.

Mr. Morris explained that the project has three key components:

- 1. Providing equal internet access as a Travel Demand Management Tool
- 2. Including a planning and design phase to identify infrastructure needs and service subscription offerings within the corridor
- Focusing on expanding digital navigation training services to help residents develop skills for using this new service.

Councilmember Mendelsohn expressed her disagreement with the use of Transportation funds for a broadband project. Councilmember Flores stated that the City of Fort Worth was in favor of this pilot project.

Upon a Motion by Councilmember Flores (seconded by Commissioner Mitchell), the Board approved the resolution as presented, with Councilmember Mendelsohn, Judge O'Hare, and Judge Huckabee voting no and Mayor Raburn abstaining.

Item 14 Status Update on NCTCOG Regional SolSmart Designation

Item 14 was pulled from the Consent Agenda by Vice President Johnson for Individual Consideration.

Susan Alverez, Director of Environment and Development provided an update on SolSmart, a national solar energy designation program. SolSmart is led by the Interstate Renewable Energy Council (IREC) and the International City/County Management Association (ICMA), with funding from the U.S. Department of Energy Solar Energy Technologies Office.

The program has two key components:

- 1. SolSmart provides no-cost technical assistance to help local governments adopt best practices for expanding solar energy use in their communities.
- 2. The program recognizes and celebrates these solar-friendly communities with SolSmart designations at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze levels.

As a result of its solar efforts and resources, the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) has recently been upgraded to a regional Silver SolSmart designation.

Item 15 Conduct a Public Hearing Regarding the Annual Fiscal Program for FY2025 and Consider a Resolution to Approve and Adopt the Annual Fiscal Program

Randy Richardson, Director of Administration, reminded the Board that the Finance Committee had been provided an in-depth presentation of the proposed budget at last month's meeting and that the Board was given a less detailed briefing at the regular meeting on that same day. He then provided an overview of the revenue sources and expenditures associated with the proposed FY 2025 Annual Budget of \$329,801,532. Vice President Johnson then opened the public hearing. There were no public comments or questions, and the public hearing was closed. The Board was requested to adopt a resolution approving the Fiscal Program.

Upon a Motion by Mayor Heidemann (seconded by Judge Little), and unanimous vote of all members present, the Board approved the resolution as presented.

Item 16 Resolution Authorizing Amendment to the Contract with HNTB Corporation to Complete the National Environmental Policy Act Process for the Dallas to Fort Worth High-Speed Transportation Connections Study

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, requested to amend the contract between NCTCOG and HNTB Corporation. The amendment would add \$1,650,343 in Surface Transportation Block Grant Program funds to the current \$12,099,657 contract, for a new total not-to-exceed amount of \$13,750,000. This includes \$2,750,000 in Regional Transportation Development Credits in lieu of local match. This additional funding will enable HNTB to conduct advance engineering on an alternative route to the west of downtown Dallas.

The additional funds will ensure sufficient resources are available for NCTCOG's contract with HNTB to complete the National Environmental Policy Act process for a high-speed rail corridor between Fort Worth and Dallas. HNTB has committed to maintaining a 31.3 percent Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) goal.

Michael Morris, Director of Transportation, presented a semi-annual status report on the Metropolitan Planning Organization Revolver Funds and Regional Transportation Council Local Pool. RESOLUTION TO REVIEW AND APPROVE NCTCOG'S INVESTMENT POLICY

WHEREAS, the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) is a Texas political subdivision and non-profit corporation organized and operating under Texas Local Government Code Chapter 391 as the regional planning commission for the 16-county North Central Texas region; and,

WHEREAS, NCTCOG is a voluntary association of, by and for local governments established to assist in planning for common needs, cooperating for mutual benefit, and coordinating for sound regional development; and,

WHEREAS, the Public Funds Investment Act requires public entities to develop written investment policies and strategies reviewed and approved annually by the governing body; and,

WHEREAS, the Public Funds Investment Act requires the governing body or designated investment committee of public entities to review and adopt annually a list of qualified brokers authorized to engage in investment transactions with the entity; and,

WHEREAS, the NCTCOG Investment Policy, which includes a listing of authorized brokers, has been presented to and reviewed by the Executive Board; and,

WHEREAS, the Executive Board finds the policy to provide for the safe and prudent investment of funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED THAT:

Section 1. The NCTCOG Executive Board approves the Investment Policy as included in Attachment 1.


Section 2. NCTCOG staff is authorized to take such investment actions as the approved policy permits with authorized brokers.

It is the policy of the North Central Council of Governments (NCTCOG) that after allowing for the anticipated cash flow requirements of NCTCOG and giving due consideration to the safety and risk of investment, all available funds shall be invested in conformance with these legal and administrative guidelines, seeking to optimize interest earnings to the maximum extent possible.

Effective cash management is recognized as essential to good fiscal management. Investment interest is a source of revenue to NCTCOG funds. The NCTCOG's investment portfolio shall be designed and managed in a manner designed to maximize this revenue source, to be responsive to public trust, and to be in compliance with legal requirements and limitations.

Investments shall be made with the primary objectives of:

- * Safety and preservation of principal
- * Maintenance of sufficient liquidity to meet operating needs
- * Public trust from prudent investment activities
- * Optimization of interest earnings on the portfolio

II. PURPOSE

The purpose of this investment policy is to comply with applicable statutes, rules, regulations and Chapter 2256 of the Government Code ("Public Funds Investment Act"), which requires NCTCOG to adopt a written investment policy regarding the investment of its funds and funds under its control. The Investment Policy addresses the methods, procedures and practices that must be exercised to ensure effective and judicious fiscal management of the NCTCOG's funds.

III. SCOPE

This Investment Policy shall govern the investment of all financial assets of NCTCOG. These funds are accounted for in the NCTCOG's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) and include:

- General Fund
- Special Revenue Funds (1)
- Internal Service Funds
- Enterprise Funds
- Any new fund created by NCTCOG, unless specifically exempted from this Policy by the Executive Board or by law.
- (1) Incudes funds of the North Central Texas Emergency Communications District

NCTCOG may consolidate cash balances from all funds to maximize investment earnings. Investment income will be allocated to the various funds based on their respective participation and in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

This Investment Policy shall apply to all transactions involving the financial assets and related activity for all the foregoing funds. However, this policy does not apply to the assets administered for the benefit of NCTCOG by outside agencies under deferred compensation programs.

The following investment strategies are the guidelines to investment of the funds of NCTCOG. All investments, when aggregated together, must be within the diversification parameters listed with the authorized investments. From time to time, on a temporary basis, the actual investments within one fund or another may vary slightly from its underlying strategy. However, these deviations should only be temporary and easily corrected.

- Operating funds include the general fund, internal service funds, and enterprise funds. These
 funds are necessary for the day to day operations of the NCTCOG's programs. Due to their shortterm nature, these funds need to be available when needed. These funds will be invested in
 instruments authorized by this policy with a maturity not exceeding 180 days.
- Advance funds include any designated local, state, or federal advance funding within special
 revenue funds. These funds are necessary for the implementation of the NCTCOG's programs
 and tend to be short-term to mid-term in nature. These funds will be invested in instruments
 authorized by this policy with a maturity matched with programmatic needs not exceeding 365
 days.
- **Designated funds** include programmed local funding within special revenue funds. These funds tend to be longer term in nature and not needed for immediate use. These funds will be invested in instruments authorized by this policy with a maturity matched with programmatic needs not exceeding two (2) years.

IV. INVESTMENT OBJECTIVES

NCTCOG shall manage and invest its cash with four primary objectives, listed in order of priority: **safety**, **liquidity**, **public trust**, **and yield**, **expressed as optimization of interest earnings**. The safety of the principal invested always remains the primary objective. All investments shall be designed and managed in a manner responsive to the public trust and consistent with state and local law.

NCTCOG shall maintain a comprehensive cash management program, which includes collection of account receivables, vendor payments in accordance with invoice terms, and prudent investment of available cash. Cash management is defined as the process of managing monies in order to insure maximum cash availability and maximum earnings on short-term investment of cash.

Safety [PFIA 2256.005(b)(2)]

Safety of principal is the foremost objective of the investment program. Investments shall be undertaken in a manner that seeks to ensure the preservation of capital in the overall portfolio. The objective will be to mitigate credit and interest rate risk.

- Credit Risk and Concentration of Credit Risk NCTCOG will minimize credit risk, the risk of loss due to the failure of the issuer or backer of the investment, and concentration of credit risk, the risk of loss attributed to the magnitude of investment in a single issuer, by:
 - o Limiting investments to the safest types of investments
 - Pre-qualifying the financial institutions and broker/dealers with which NCTCOG will do business
 - Diversifying the investment portfolio so that potential losses on individual issuers will be minimized.
- Interest Rate Risk NCTCOG will manage the risk that the interest earnings and the market value
 of investments in the portfolio will fall due to changes in general interest rates by limiting the

maximum weighted average maturity of the investment portfolio to 365 days. NCTCOG will, in addition:

- Structure the investment portfolio so that investments mature to meet cash requirements for ongoing operations, thereby avoiding the need to liquidate investments prior to maturity.
- Invest operating funds primarily in certificates of deposit, shorter-term securities, money market mutual funds, or local government investment pools functioning as money market mutual funds.
- Diversify maturities and staggering purchase dates to minimize the impact of market movements over time.

Liquidity [PFIA 2256.005(b)(2)]

The investment portfolio shall remain sufficiently liquid to meet all operating requirements that may be reasonably anticipated. This is accomplished by structuring the portfolio so that investments mature concurrent with cash needs to meet anticipated demands. Because all possible cash demands cannot be anticipated, a portion of the portfolio will be invested in shares of money market mutual funds or local government investment pools that offer same-day liquidity. In addition, a portion of the portfolio may consist of securities with active secondary or resale markets.

Public Trust

All participants in NCTCOG's investment process shall seek to act responsibly as custodians of the public trust. Investment officers shall avoid any transaction that might impair public confidence in NCTCOG's ability to govern effectively.

Yield (Optimization of Interest Earnings) [PFIA 2256.005(b)(3)]

The investment portfolio shall be designed with the objective of attaining a market rate of return throughout budgetary and economic cycles, taking into account the investment risk constraints and liquidity needs. Return on investment is of secondary importance compared to the safety and liquidity objectives described above.

V. RESPONSIBILITY AND CONTROL

Delegation of Authority [PFIA 2256.005(f)]

In accordance with applicable statutes, rules, regulations and the Public Funds Investment Act, the Board designates the Director of Administration as NCTCOG's Investment Officer. An Investment Officer or designee is authorized to execute investment transactions on behalf of NCTCOG. No person may engage in an investment transaction or the management of NCTCOG funds except as provided under the terms of this Investment Policy as approved by the Board. The investment authority granted to the investing officers is effective until rescinded by the Board.

Quality and Capability of Investment Management [PFIA 2256.005(b)(3)]

NCTCOG shall provide periodic training in investments for the designated investment officer(s) and other investment personnel through courses and seminars offered by professional organizations, associations, and other independent sources in order to insure the quality and capability of investment management in compliance with the Public Funds Investment Act.

Training Requirement [PFIA 2256.008 - Local Governments]

In accordance with applicable statutes, rules, regulations and the Public Funds Investment Act, designated Investment Officers shall attend an investment training session no less often than once every

two years commencing on the first day of NCTCOG's fiscal year and consisting of the two consecutive fiscal years following that date. and shall receive not less than 10 hours of instruction relating to investment responsibilities. A newly appointed Investment Officer must attend a training session of at least 10 hours of instruction within twelve months of the date the officer took office or assumed the officer's duties. The investment training session shall be provided by an independent source approved by the Board (see Attachment). For purposes of this policy, an "independent source" from which investment training shall be obtained shall include a professional organization, an institution of higher education or any other sponsor other than a business organization with whom NCTCOG may engage in an investment transaction.

Internal Controls

The Director of Administration is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure designed to ensure that the assets of NCTCOG are protected from loss, theft, or misuse. The internal control structure shall be designed to provide reasonable assurance that these objectives are met. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that (1) the cost of a control should not exceed the benefits likely to be derived; and (2) the valuation of costs and benefits requires estimates and judgments by management.

Accordingly, the Director of Administration shall establish a process for annual independent review by an external auditor to assure compliance with policies and procedures. The internal controls shall address the following points.

- Control of collusion.
- Separation of transactions authority from accounting and record keeping.
- · Custodial safekeeping.
- · Avoidance of physical delivery securities.
- Clear delegation of authority to subordinate staff members.
- Written confirmation for all transactions for investments and wire transfers.
- Development of a wire transfer agreement with the depository bank or third party custodian.

Prudence [PFIA 2256.006]

The standard of prudence to be applied by the Investment Officer shall be the "prudent investor" rule. This rule states that "Investments shall be made with judgment and care, under circumstances then prevailing, which persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the probable safety of their capital as well as the probable income to be derived." In determining whether an Investment Officer has exercised prudence with respect to an investment decision, the determination shall be made taking into consideration:

- The investment of all funds, or funds under NCTCOG's control, over which the officer had responsibility rather than a consideration as to the prudence of a single investment.
- Whether the investment decision was consistent with the written approved investment policy of NCTCOG.

Indemnification

The Investment Officer, acting in accordance with written procedures and exercising due diligence, shall not be held personally responsible for a specific investment's credit risk or market price changes, provided that these deviations are reported immediately and the appropriate action is taken to control adverse developments.

Ethics and Conflicts of Interest [PFIA 2256.005(i)]

Officers and employees involved in the investment process shall refrain from personal business activity that would conflict with the proper execution and management of the investment program, or that would impair their ability to make impartial decisions. Employees and Investment Officers shall disclose any material interests in financial institutions with which they conduct business. They shall further disclose any personal financial/investment positions that could be related to the performance of the investment portfolio. Employees and officers shall refrain from undertaking personal investment transactions with the same individual with which business is conducted on behalf of the NCTCOG.

An Investment Officer of NCTCOG who has a personal business relationship with an organization seeking to sell an investment to NCTCOG shall file a statement disclosing that personal business interest. An Investment Officer who is related within the second degree by affinity or consanguinity to an individual seeking to sell an investment to NCTCOG shall file a statement disclosing that relationship. A statement required under this subsection must be filed with the Texas Ethics Commission and the Board.

VI. SUITABLE AND AUTHORIZED INVESTMENTS

Portfolio Management

NCTCOG currently has a "buy and hold" portfolio strategy. Maturity dates are matched with cash flow requirements and investments are purchased with the intent to be held until maturity. However, investments may be liquidated prior to maturity for the following reasons:

- An investment with declining credit may be liquidated early to minimize loss of principal.
- Cash flow needs of NCTCOG require that the investment be liquidated.
- Portfolio restructuring to accommodate NCTCOG needs and requirements or to address market conditions.

Investments [PFIA 2256.005(b)(4)(A)]

NCTCOG funds governed by this policy may be invested in the instruments described below, all of which are authorized by Chapter 2256 of the Government Code (Public Funds Investment Act). Investment of NCTCOG funds in any instrument or security not authorized for investment under the Act is prohibited. NCTCOG will not be required to liquidate an investment that becomes unauthorized subsequent to its purchase.

I. Authorized

- 1. Obligations of the United States of America, its agencies and instrumentalities.
- 2. Certificates of Deposit issued by a depository institution that has its main office or a branch office in Texas. The certificate of deposit must be guaranteed or insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or its successor or the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund or its successor and secured by obligations in a manner and amount as provided by law. In addition, certificates of deposit obtained through a depository institution that has its main office or a branch office in Texas and that contractually agrees to place the funds in federally insured depository institutions in accordance with the conditions prescribed in Section 2256.010(b) of the Public Funds Investment Act are authorized investments.
- 3. Fully collateralized direct repurchase agreements with a defined termination date secured by obligations of the United States or its agencies and instrumentalities. These shall be pledged to NCTCOG, held in NCTCOG's name, and deposited at the time the investment is made with NCTCOG or with a third party selected and approved by NCTCOG. Repurchase agreements must be purchased through a primary government securities dealer, as defined by the Federal Reserve, or a financial institution doing business in Texas. A Master Repurchase Agreement must be signed by the bank/dealer prior to investment in a repurchase agreement. All

- repurchase agreement transactions will be on a delivery vs. payment basis. Securities received for repurchase agreements must have a market value greater than or equal to 102 percent at the time funds are disbursed. (Sweep Accounts and/or Bond Proceeds)
- 4. Money Market Mutual funds that: 1) are registered and regulated by the Securities and Exchange Commission, 2) have a dollar weighted average stated maturity of 90 days or less, 3) seek to maintain a net asset value of \$1.00 per share, and 4) are rated AAA by at least one nationally recognized rating service.
- 5. Local government investment pools, which 1) meet the requirements of Chapter 2256.016 of the Public Funds Investment Act, 2) are rated no lower than AAA or an equivalent rating by at least one nationally recognized rating service, and 3) are authorized by resolution or ordinance by the Board. In addition, a local government investment pool created to function as a money market mutual fund must mark its portfolio to the market daily and, to the extent reasonably possible, stabilize at \$1.00 net asset value.

All prudent measures will be taken to liquidate an investment that is downgraded to less than the required minimum rating. (*PFIA 2256.021*)

II. Not Authorized [PFIA 2256.009(b)(1-4)]

Investments including interest-only or principal-only strips of obligations with underlying mortgage-backed security collateral, collateralized mortgage obligations with an inverse floating interest rate or a maturity date of over 10 years are strictly prohibited.

VII. INVESTMENT PARAMETERS

Maximum Maturities [PFIA 2256.005(b)(4)(B)]

The longer the maturity of investments, the greater their price volatility. Therefore, it is NCTCOG's policy to concentrate its investment portfolio in shorter-term securities in order to limit principal risk caused by changes in interest rates.

NCTCOG attempts to match its investments with anticipated cash flow requirements. NCTCOG will not directly invest in securities maturing more than two (2) years from the date of purchase; however, the above described obligations, certificates, or agreements may be collateralized using longer dated investments.

Because no secondary market exists for repurchase agreements, the maximum maturity shall be 120 days except in the case of a flexible repurchase agreement for bond proceeds. The maximum maturity for such an investment shall be determined in accordance with project cash flow projections and the requirements of the governing bond ordinance.

The composite portfolio will have a weighted average maturity of 365 days or less. This dollar-weighted average maturity will be calculated using the stated final maturity dates of each security. [PFIA 2256.005(b)(4)(C)]

Diversification [PFIA 2256.005(b)(3)]

NCTCOG recognizes that investment risks can result from issuer defaults, market price changes or various technical complications leading to temporary illiquidity. Risk is managed through portfolio diversification that shall be achieved by the following general guidelines:

- Limiting investments to avoid over concentration in investments from a specific issuer or business sector (excluding U.S. Treasury securities and certificates of deposit that are fully insured and collateralized in accordance with state and federal law),
- Limiting investment in investments that have higher credit risks (example: commercial paper),
- · Investing in investments with varying maturities, and
- Continuously investing a portion of the portfolio in readily available funds such as local government investment pools (LGIPs), money market funds or overnight repurchase agreements to ensure that appropriate liquidity is maintained in order to meet ongoing obligations.

The following maximum limits, by instrument, are established for NCTCOG's portfolio:

- 1. U.S. Treasury Securities
 100%

 2. U.S. Agencies and Instrumentalities
 85%

 3. Certificates of Deposit
 100%

 4. Repurchase Agreements (1)
 20%

 5. Money Market Mutual Funds (2)
 50%

 6. Authorized Pools
 100%
- (1) Excluding flexible repurchase agreements for bond proceeds investments
- ⁽²⁾ No single investment in any one money market mutual fund which exceeds 10% of the total assets of the money market mutual fund

VIII. SELECTION OF BANKS AND DEALERS

Depository [Chapter 105.017, Local Government Code]

At least every 5 years a Depository shall be selected through the NCTCOG's banking services procurement process, which shall include a formal request for proposal (RFP). The selection of a depository will be determined by competitive bid and evaluation of bids will be based on the following selection criteria:

- The ability to qualify as a depository for public funds in accordance with state law.
- The ability to provide requested information or financial statements for the periods specified.
- The ability to meet all requirements in the banking RFP.
- Complete response to all required items on the bid form
- Lowest net banking service cost, consistent with the ability to provide an appropriate level of service.
- The credit worthiness and financial stability of the bank.

Authorized Brokers/Dealers [PFIA 2256.025]

NCTCOG shall, at least annually, review, revise, and adopt a list of qualified brokers/dealers and financial institutions authorized to engage in securities transactions with NCTCOG. A designated investment committee or Executive Board will at least annually review and adopt the list of qualified brokers/dealers (see Attachment). Those firms that request to become qualified bidders for securities transactions will be required to provide a completed broker/dealer questionnaire that provides information regarding creditworthiness, experience and reputation and 2) a certification stating the firm has received, read and understood NCTCOG's investment policy and agree to comply with the policy. Authorized firms may include primary dealers or regional dealers that qualify under Securities & Exchange Commission Rule 15C3-1 (Uniform Net Capital Rule), and qualified depositories. All investment providers, including financial institutions, banks, money market mutual funds, and local government investment pools, must sign a certification acknowledging that the organization has received and reviewed NCTCOG's

investment policy and that reasonable procedures and controls have been implemented to preclude investment transactions that are not authorized by NCTCOG's policy. [PFIA 2256.005(k-l)]

Competitive Bids

It is the policy of NCTCOG to require competitive bidding for all individual security purchases and sales except for: a) transactions with money market mutual funds and local government investment pools and b) treasury and agency securities purchased at issue through an approved broker/dealer or financial institution.

Delivery vs. Payment [PFIA 2256.005(b)(4)(E)]

Securities shall be purchased using the **delivery vs. payment** method with the exception of investment pools and mutual funds. Funds will be released after notification that the purchased security has been received.

IX. CUSTODIAL CREDIT RISK MANAGEMENT

Safekeeping and Custodial Agreements

NCTCOG shall contract with a bank or banks for the safekeeping of securities either owned by NCTCOG as part of its investment portfolio or held as collateral to secure demand or time deposits. Securities owned by NCTCOG shall be held in NCTCOG's name as evidenced by safekeeping receipts of the institution holding the securities.

Collateral for deposits will be held by a third party custodian designated by NCTCOG and pledged to NCTCOG as evidenced by safekeeping receipts of the institution with which the collateral is deposited. Original safekeeping receipts shall be obtained. Collateral may be held by the depository bank's trust department, a Federal Reserve bank or branch of a Federal Reserve bank, a Federal Home Loan Bank, or a third party bank approved by NCTCOG.

Collateral Policy [PFCA 2257.023]

Consistent with the requirements of the Public Funds Collateral Act, it is the policy of NCTCOG to require full collateralization of all NCTCOG funds on deposit with a depository bank, other than investments. In order to anticipate market changes and provide a level of security for all funds, the collateralization level will be 105% of market value of principal and accrued interest on the deposits or investments less an amount insured by the FDIC. At its discretion, NCTCOG may require a higher level of collateralization for certain investment securities. Securities pledged as collateral shall be held by an independent third party with which NCTCOG has a current custodial agreement. The Deputy Executive Director is responsible for entering into collateralization agreements with third party custodians in compliance with this Policy. The agreements are to specify the acceptable investment securities for collateral, including provisions relating to possession of the collateral, the substitution or release of investment securities, ownership of securities, and the method of valuation of securities. A clearly marked evidence of ownership (safekeeping receipt) must be supplied to NCTCOG and retained. Collateral shall be reviewed at least monthly to assure that the market value of the pledged securities is adequate.

Collateral Defined

NCTCOG shall accept only the following types of collateral:

- Obligations of the United States or its agencies and instrumentalities
- Direct obligations of the state of Texas or its agencies and instrumentalities

- Collateralized mortgage obligations directly issued by a federal agency or instrumentality of the United States, the underlying security for which is guaranteed by an agency or instrumentality of the United States
- Obligations of states, agencies, counties, cities, and other political subdivisions of any state rated
 as to investment quality by a nationally recognized rating firm not less than A or its equivalent with
 a remaining maturity of ten (10) years or less
- A surety bond issued by an insurance company rated as to investment quality by a nationally recognized rating firm not less than A
- A letter of credit issued to NCTCOG by the Federal Home Loan Bank

Subject to Audit

All collateral shall be subject to inspection and audit by the NCTCOG or NCTCOG's independent auditors.

X. PERFORMANCE

Performance Standards

NCTCOG's investment portfolio will be managed in accordance with the parameters specified within this policy. The portfolio shall be designed with the objective of obtaining a rate of return through budgetary and economic cycles, commensurate with the investment risk constraints and the cash flow requirements of NCTCOG.

Performance Benchmark

It is the policy of NCTCOG to purchase investments with maturity dates coinciding with cash flow needs. Through this strategy, NCTCOG shall seek to optimize interest earnings utilizing allowable investments available on the market at that time. Market value will be calculated on a quarterly basis on all securities owned and compared to current book value. NCTCOG's portfolio shall be designed with the objective of regularly meeting or exceeding the average rate of return on U.S. Treasury Bills at a maturity level comparable to NCTCOG's weighted average maturity in days.

XI. REPORTING [PFIA 2256.023]

Methods

The Investment Officer shall prepare an investment report on a quarterly basis that summarizes investment strategies employed in the most recent quarter and describes the portfolio in terms of investment securities, maturities, and shall explain the total investment return for the quarter.

The quarterly investment report shall include a summary statement of investment activity prepared in compliance with generally accepted accounting principals. This summary will be prepared in a manner that will allow NCTCOG to ascertain whether investment activities during the reporting period have conformed to the Investment Policy. The report will be provided to the Board. The report will include the following:

- A listing of individual securities held at the end of the reporting period.
- Unrealized gains or losses resulting from appreciation or depreciation by listing the beginning and ending book and market value of securities for the period.
- Additions and changes to the market value during the period.
- Average weighted yield to maturity of portfolio as compared to applicable benchmark.
- Listing of investments by maturity date.
- · Fully accrued interest for the reporting period

- The percentage of the total portfolio that each type of investment represents.
- Statement of compliance of NCTCOG's investment portfolio with state law and the investment strategy and policy approved by the Board.

An independent auditor will perform a formal annual review of the quarterly reports with the results reported to the governing body [PFIA 2256.023(d)].

Monitoring Market Value [PFIA 2256.005(b)(4)(D)]

Market value of all securities in the portfolio will be determined on a quarterly basis. These values will be obtained from a reputable and independent source and disclosed to the governing body quarterly in a written report.

XII. INVESTMENT POLICY ADOPTION [PFIA 2256.005(e)]

NCTCOG's investment policy shall be adopted by resolution of the Board. It is NCTCOG's intent to comply with state laws and regulations. NCTCOG's investment policy shall be subject to revisions consistent with changing laws, regulations, and needs of NCTCOG. The Board shall adopt a resolution stating that it has reviewed the policy and investment strategies at least annually, approving any changes or modifications.

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT AND APPROVE THE QUARTERLY INVESTMENT REPORT

WHEREAS, the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) is a Texas political subdivision and non-profit corporation organized and operating under Texas Local Government Code Chapter 391 as the regional planning commission for the 16-county North Central Texas region; and,

WHEREAS, NCTCOG is a voluntary association of, by and for local governments established to assist in planning for common needs, cooperating for mutual benefit, and coordinating for sound regional development; and,

WHEREAS, NCTCOG's Quarterly Investment Report for the quarter ended September 30, 2024, is hereby submitted in accordance with the Public Funds Investment Act; and,

WHEREAS, the Executive Board has reviewed the document and finds it to be in compliance with the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED THAT:



Item Title: Resolution Authorizing New Greenville Workforce Center Lease

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG), in its capacity as the Administrative Entity and designated Grant Recipient/Fiscal Agent of the North Central Texas Workforce Development Board, currently operates a workforce center located on the 2nd and 3rd floors of the Greenville Exchange Building located at 2500 Stonewall Street in Greenville, Texas. The Center encompasses 9,141 square feet of office space at an average price of \$20.12 per square foot, with a lease term scheduled to expire on May 31, 2025. The building is owned by Hunt County.

This lease was approved for a short-term two (2) year lease extension effective May 9, 2023, to allow for post-pandemic customer traffic patterns to stabilize and for staff to develop a strategic and comprehensive approach to where and how many stand-alone Centers are located throughout the 14-County region. The current lease includes a termination option available at any time throughout the lease term with a 90-day notice to the landlord. Further extension options for this lease are not available due to Hunt County's own needs for this space.

Since the time of the lease extension described above, NCTCOG staff have negotiated terms for a new lease location as follows:

Landlord: ARCO Holdings Group, LLC

Location: 4601 King Street, Greenville, Texas

Square footage: 2,290 Lease term: Five (5) Years

Base Rental Rate: \$31.44 including base rent and tenant improvement allowance, excluding taxes, insurance, common area maintenance, tenant improvement amortization, janitorial and utilities. Base rental rate is flat (no escalation).

Parking: Eight (8) parking spots per one thousand (1,000) square feet (18 total)

Other benefits of the proposed location include access to a 2,000 square foot event room, and the landlord agreeing to manage tenant improvements. The lease would include an effective date of the later of March 1, 2025, or the time of substantial completion of tenant improvements.

NCTCOG's real estate broker, Avison Young, performed a current market survey of other comparable properties (Exhibit A) and confirmed the proposed terms are within the market price for the surrounding area.

This lease was recommended for approval by the Executive Committee of the North Central Texas Workforce Development Board on October 15, 2024.

A draft resolution authorizing a lease agreement with ARCO Holdings Group, LLC, is attached for Executive Board consideration.

One of the Expansion Grant employer partners, Lippert Components, Inc., is providing apprenticeship training in the FastTrack Welding Registered Apprenticeship Program, increasing awareness and education about the program across the region to diverse candidate groups, and promoting sustainable career opportunities in the Advanced Manufacturing industry sector.

NCTCOG and Lippert Components, Inc. entered into a contract for apprenticeship training services on May 3rd, 2024 with a current term end date of April 30, 2025. Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program (RCPGP) and Acceptance of Funding

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) has applied for and was recently awarded the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) GY2024 Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program (RCPGP) focused on community resilience in the NCTCOG region with special consideration for disadvantaged communities. The grant will help build regional capacity to manage catastrophic incidents by improving and expanding collaboration for catastrophic incident preparedness.

Notifications to principal city or regions receiving the award were made in late September 2024. The NCTCOG region was one of six recipients selected nationwide. The federal performance period for projects under this FEMA GY2024 RCPGP is October 1, 2024, to September 30, 2027. The grant program is 100% federally funded with no local cost-share or match requirements. This funding is a part of the FEMA GY2024 Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Appropriations Act.

Impacts from regional catastrophic incidents have a profound effect on the entire North Texas region, as demonstrated through the COVID-19 pandemic, Hurricanes Harvey and Laura, Winter Storm Uri, and multiple severe storms and wildfires. This project will increase community resilience throughout the region through work completed in three different phases:

- Phase I will increase awareness of locally significant threats and hazards across the community, and provide knowledge and tools for mitigation, response, and recovery through training, workshops, and exercises.
- Phase II will focus on enhancing emergency response and evacuation plans for jurisdictions in our NCTCOG region with a focus on community resilience, the projected impact of climate change, and the needs of vulnerable populations.
- Phase III includes a two-day community resilience workshop for community leaders, emergency managers, and other key stakeholders to showcase deliverables, best practices, and areas for improvement based on the first two phases.

A draft resolution endorsing the application of the RCPGP and acceptance of approximately \$1,492,902 in FEMA GY2024 is attached for Executive Board consideration.

Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Agreements for Federal Transit Administration Funding

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) is a designated recipient for Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funds in the Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington, Denton-Lewisville and McKinney-Frisco Urbanized Areas for the following two programs: Urbanized Area Formula Program, and Bus and Bus Facilities Program. On April 4, 2024, FTA published full Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 apportionments, which consisted of \$128 million for the Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington, Denton-Lewisville, and McKinney-Frisco urbanized areas from these two programs. Consistent with the FY 2025–2028 Transportation Improvement Program approved by the Regional Transportation Council, \$11,682,925 of the regional total is available for NCTCOG to utilize and pass through for local public transit providers. Local funds from transit providers as well as Transportation Development Credits will be used as match for these federal funds.

The Urbanized Area Formula Program is \$120.2 million for the Dallas-Fort Worth-Arlington, Denton-Lewisville and McKinney-Frisco urbanized areas. NCTCOG will enter into a grant agreement with FTA for \$10,954,574 in FY 2024 Urbanized Area Formula Program funds. NCTCOG will retain \$5,367,732 of these funds for mobility management efforts, small transit provider needs, administration, and regional planning. The following transit providers will utilize the remainder of funds for service: City/County Transportation (Johnson County); Community Transit Services (Ellis and Navarro Counties); Public Transit Services (Parker and Palo Pinto Counties); Span, Inc. (Denton and Collin Counties); and STAR Transit (Kaufman, Rockwall, and Dallas Counties).

The Bus and Bus Facilities Program is \$7.7 million for the region. NCTCOG will enter into a grant agreement with FTA for \$728,351 in FY 2024 Bus and Bus Facilities Program funds. NCTCOG will utilize \$613,349 to purchase vehicles on behalf of small transit providers and \$115,002 for administrative purposes. Details about both programs are provided in Attachment 1.

In addition, the Regional Transportation Council approved Surface Transportation Block Grant Program funds in April 2023 for the Transit Driver Workforce Development and Training Program to address the shortage of transit drivers and the Regional Transit Coordination Program to increase regional coordination of transit services. Details are provided in Attachment 2. To carry out these initiatives, NCTCOG will need to enter into a grant agreement with FTA.

Item Title: Resolution Endorsing Grant Applications to the Department of Defense for the

Community Noise Mitigation Program

The Department of Defense has funding available through the Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC) for the Community Noise Mitigation Program. This program is intended to assist local governments impacted by military fixed-wing aviation noise through the installation of noise mitigating insulation at covered facilities, with specific funding set aside for reserve bases that have transitioned to a new type or model of aircraft. The Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base Fort Worth (NAS JRB Fort Worth) is in the process of transitioning from F-16 to F-35 aircraft. Covered facilities eligible for the program include schools that are experiencing high levels of indoor noise as a result of the military aviation operations. Two Independent School Districts (ISDs) near NAS JRB Fort Worth are interested in participating: Lake Worth and White Settlement. The grant applications will include noise insulation construction in six facilities in these two ISDs.

NAS JRB Fort Worth is a critical economic generator for the Dallas-Fort Worth region. Lockheed Martin is collocated with the military installation and sharing the runway. This Lockheed Martin facility serves as the final assembly point for the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter. Together, NAS JRB Fort Worth and Lockheed Martin provide an approximate \$9 billion annual economic impact to the region.

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) Executive Board has supported efforts to support compatible land-use planning in partnership with local governments surrounding NAS JRB Fort Worth in order to preserve the military mission in the event of any future Base Realignment and Closure. The NCTCOG Executive Board has also previously supported these efforts through the land banking program with a purchase of land directly at the end of the runway considered incompatible with military operations. These efforts have also focused on improving the quality of life for residents living near the military installation. A recommendation of the most recent Joint Land Use Study conducted for NAS JRB Fort Worth identified noise mitigation, specifically through a program that provides direct noise insulation in schools and other sensitive land uses, as a near-term recommendation to pursue. The Community Noise Mitigation Program will directly provide quality-of-life improvements for students and educators while improving the compatibility of communities near the base.

The grant application requires pre-acoustical testing to determine the indoor noise levels, as there are minimum noise level requirements to be eligible to apply for the grant. Due to the grant application deadline, NCTCOG entered into a personal services agreement in an amount of \$112,000 with Richard Salz to perform this work in advance of seeking Executive Board approval. Staff requests endorsement of this contract.

A second, but separate, component necessary to complete the grant application is the development of construction costs estimates. Under the Executive Director's delegated authority, NCTCOG entered into a contract with Core Construction Services of Texas, Inc. (through a purchasing cooperative) in an amount of \$18,136 for this purpose. These two contractors enable NCTCOG to develop the technical information and cost estimates to "size" the amount of funds to apply for in the grant applications.

The grant application deadline was October 22, 2024. The North Central Texas Council of Governments has submitted six grant applications under this funding opportunity. Each ISD facility will have a separate application per program guidelines. The applications fund noise insulation construction activities, such as replacement of windows and doors. NCTCOG will serve as the prime recipient. NCTCOG is requesting approximately \$4,000,000 in federal Department of Defense (DOD) funds. This grant opportunity requires a 10 percent match. RTC Local funds previously approved by the RTC as part of the Regional Joint Land Use Study will be used for 5 percent of the match. The Lake Worth and White Settlement ISDs will pay the remaining 5 percent portion of the local match. Staff also requests authorization to enter into an agreement with the DOD.

A draft resolution endorsing submittal of the grant applications to the DOD for the Community Noise Mitigation Program and endorsement of a personal services agreement in the amount of \$112,000 is attached for Executive Board consideration. I will provide a brief presentation on this item and will be available to answer any questions prior to requesting Board approval.

Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Grant Agreement for the Federal Highway Administration

Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Community Program

In 2023, the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) offered \$350 million through the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Community Program to build electric vehicle (EV) charging stations throughout communities across the country, with focus on underserved areas. In response to this opportunity, the Regional Transportation Council and Executive Board approved submittal of the North Texas Equitable Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NTx-EEVI) Project application in May 2023. Through this project, the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) applied on behalf of the 16-county region to deploy up to 100 EV charging station ports on public-sector properties that fill gaps in the existing charging network and meet other key program criteria. To expedite implementation, NCTCOG proposed to hire a consultant to assist local governments with permitting, zoning, utility coordination, and other processes that typically cause project delays. Additional project partners will include subrecipient public-sector agencies that will host EV charging stations on their properties, and private-sector vendor(s) who will be contracted to install, operate, and maintain charging stations.

FHWA awarded NCTCOG the maximum allowed grant amount. Through agreement negotiation with FHWA, staff has finalized an award budget of \$15 million in federal funds, with up to 759,471 regional Transportation Development Credits (TDCs) as match for Phase 1 activities, which include NCTCOG administrative and consultant costs; and matching funds of \$2,990,529 local contribution from private-sector vendor(s) contracted for Phase 2 activities, which includes acquisition, construction, installation, operations, or maintenance of the EV charging stations.

Staff will request Executive Board approval to execute a grant agreement to receive \$15 million in federal funding from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) for the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) Community Program. Additional pass-through contracts and subawards to implement the project will be brought to the Executive Board for approval.

A draft resolution authorizing the agreement with FHWA is attached. I will provide a brief presentation on this item and be available to answer any questions prior to requesting Board approval. Additional details are attached.



Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Agreements for Local Air Quality Planning Activities

Funded with Texas Commission on Environmental Quality Rider 7 Funds

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) administers funds for local air quality planning activities under Rider 7 of the agency's legislative appropriation. This funding can be used to inventory fine particulate matter (PM_{2.5})-related emissions, monitor PM_{2.5}-related pollution levels, and to cover administrative costs. On February 7, 2024, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) strengthened the National Ambient Air Quality Standards for Particulate Matter (PM NAAQS) to protect millions of Americans from harmful and costly health impacts. EPA set the level of the primary (health-based) annual PM_{2.5} standard from 12.0 to 9.0 micrograms per cubic meter. This change has the potential to bring Dallas and Tarrant Counties into non-attainment for this standard. Ellis County does not currently have an active monitoring device; the last available annual design value from 2021 is announced to be at 9.2 micrograms per cubic meter. The current discussed recommendation by the TCEQ is unclassifiable. All counties potentially being classified as non-attainment within the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) region are eligible to participate in this program.

To implement these initiatives, staff recommends awarding Kevin G. Overton up to \$80,000 to assist in PM_{2.5} data collection and analysis to determine the current PM_{2.5} pollution levels, spatial and temporal variability, as well as distinguish between particle transported into the region, background pollution and local contributions. Staff also recommends awarding up to \$320,000 to the Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI) to carry out monitoring of PM_{2.5} and meteorological data at the respective monitoring stations, aiming for data for a consecutive year between October 2024 and October 2025. The remaining funds will be used for staff activities.

A draft resolution authorizing agreements to implement these initiatives is attached for Executive Board consideration. I will provide a brief presentation on this item and will be available to answer any questions prior to requesting Board approval.

Item Title: Resolution Authorizing Contracts with Model 1 Commercial Vehicles, Inc.

and TRC Engineering Services, LLC for Transit Vehicles for Small Transit

Providers

The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG), as the designated recipient for Federal Transit Administration (FTA) funding for North Central Texas, recently initiated two procurements. The first procurement was for transit vehicles for small transit providers to support urban transportation services and the second was for required in-plant inspection services. Both procurements will utilize FTA funds and Regional Transportation Council Transportation Development Credits (TDCs) in lieu of local cash match.

On March 1, 2024, NCTCOG issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for qualified vendors to design, manufacture and deliver Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessible light-duty cutaway buses. NCTCOG requested prices for a contract for 19 small light-duty cutaway vehicles. NCTCOG received proposals from two vendors. On April 24, 2024, the Vendor Selection Committee met and reviewed the proposals. The Committee recommended an award to Model 1 Commercial Vehicles, Inc. for light-duty cutaway transit vehicles.

FTA requires an in-plant inspector during the vehicle manufacturing process for procurements of more than 10 vehicles. NCTCOG issued a Request for Statement of Qualifications and Interest for In-plant Inspection Services on July 5, 2024. NCTCOG received statements of qualifications and interest from two vendors offering inspection services. On September 18, 2024, the Consultant Selection Committee met and reviewed the proposals. The Committee recommended award to TRC Engineering Services, LLC for inspection services.

A draft resolution authorizing contracts with Model 1 Commercial Vehicles, Inc. and TRC Engineering Services, LLC is attached for Executive Board consideration. The contract with Model 1 Commercial Vehicles, Inc., is for nineteen 19 light-duty cutaway buses, for a total amount not to exceed \$2,600,000. The contract for TRC Engineering Services, LLC is for a total amount not to exceed \$75,000. Regional Transportation Council Transportation Development Credits will be utilized as matching funds. I will provide a brief presentation of this item and will be available to answer any questions prior to requesting Board approval.


