Grease Interceptor Inspector Training is Now Open!

The Wastewater and Treatment Education Roundtable (WATER) is hosting the Grease Interceptor Inspector Training on **October 1 and 2, 2018**.

This course is aimed at municipal staff responsible for inspecting grease interceptors. The objective of this course is for participants to learn about the management, operation, and maintenance of grease interceptors and traps (grease vessels). It introduces wastewater collection system concerns and initial fats, oils, and grease (FOGs) program action plans. It also covers the basics of restaurant and kitchen inspections related to grease vessels; vessel inspections, compliance, approvals, and installation; and documentation.

Neal Klimek, of Knowgrease Services Inc., will be instructing the training. The first day of instruction is in a classroom environment. Participants will visit facilities with various types of interceptors/grease vessels on the second day. Participants will need to coordinate their own travel/carpool to sites. The classroom location will be at NCTCOG Offices, 616 Six Flags Drive, Arlington, Texas 76011. Sites will be in Arlington, Texas.

Up to two individuals from each WATER cost-sharing organization are eligible for the discounted registration fee of \$135; additional registrants will be charged \$275. Non-WATER cost-sharing organizations will be charged \$275 for each registrant.

Lunch, beverages, and other refreshments are included in the cost of registration. NCTCOG will invoice individuals after registration is complete.

Implementation Strategy 2.1: Local Supplemental Environmental Projects

Supplemental Environmental Projects (SEPs) is a program managed by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) through which the respondent of an enforcement action can fund an approved project to offset assessed penalties. SEPs are projects that prevent pollution, reduce the amount of pollution reaching the environment, or enhances the quality of the environment. Potential SEPs include cleanup of abandoned tire sites or illegal dump sites; community collection of electronics, large municipal household items, or household hazardous waste; and pollution prevention projects that exceed regulatory requirements. Cities and non-profits can become recipients of SEP funds by submitting a third-party <u>application</u> to
